PROSPECTUS OF THE SECOND VOLUME OF THE JOURNAL OF EDUCATION FOR UPPER CANADA. EDITED BY THE REV. EGERTON RYERSON, D. D. CHIEF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS; ASSISTED BY MR. J. GEO. HODGINS.

THESE Townships are at present included in the Wellington District, and held by a very doubtful claim. By neglect or oversight, the mistake was evidently not corrected. Nor has it been tried to be remedied since, though the extent of the Huron territory was brought before Parliament in 1846. Now have the Magistrates in Quarter Sessions at Goderich, in their application to the Assembly, claimed the full extent of the right. The following Memorandum having a reference to the subject, was drawn up in July, 1847, to revise the claim, and is now submitted to the public:
