### Should Receive Help.

Saturday we referred to the sad case  
of Mrs. Gould, of Flower's Cove,  
whose son Michael, aged 17, was  
brought here by the Prospero and  
taken to the Lunatic Asylum. We  
find that Mrs. Gould has two other  
sons who are totally blind and who  
are a great care on her. Her hus-  
band also is a cripple and cannot work  
and the loss of the other boy, Michael,  
throws the burden of supporting the  
others upon her shoulders. The lad,  
who is eager and industrious, was at  
the fishery all summer, but as it  
proved a failure he went into the  
woods to work cutting telegraph  
poles. While "shelling" one of the  
poles which were very heavy the  
poor boy's foot turned under, was badly  
sprained and became very much  
swollen and causing him great pain.  
One of the doctors down the coast  
operated on him, cutting open the leg,  
and since that time—nine days  
ago up to Saturday—proper  
attention had not been given  
the limb. The boy's brain became af-  
fected with the pain, and when he  
was brought down to Battle Harbor  
Hospital it was just closing and he  
was transferred to the Prospero for  
St. John's accompanied by his mother.  
The poor boy had neither coat, vest,  
cap nor boots on him when landed  
here, and was clad only in a pants  
and singlet. The weather was excep-  
tionally cold Saturday, and when the  
boy was being taken to the Asylum  
the police who went with him had to  
wrap him up in blankets for the sake  
of warmth. Mrs. Gould also had very  
little clothing on her to protect her  
from the cold, yet she accompanied  
her boy to the Asylum and cried as if  
her heart would break on leaving him.  
The money so kindly collected for  
her on the Prospero by Rev. Mr. Pit-  
cher and Chief Steward Miller was a  
god send as it enabled her to buy  
some clothing for herself. It did not  
amount to a large sum, however, and  
the charitably disposed could not do  
better than by extending some help to  
the poor creature who has now no  
person to care for her.

### Alarm of Fire.

children playing with matches caused it.

Turkey is in a desperate condition

tector. If the ally that the Grand  
Vizier talks about is in reality her  
protector, Turkish independence is  
gone never to return. If Turkey is  
able to find an efficacious protector,  
capable of guaranteeing her a renew-  
ed lease of life, she will readily make  
some sacrifice in exchange. If not,  
she will, if she can, plunge the whole  
of Europe into war. Anyhow, it is  
certain that she will not conclude  
peace with Italy, unless she can se-  
cure beforehand the aid of some pro-  
tector for the future.

### Hankow Recaptured.

SIKOK, China, Oct. 29.  
The native city of Hankow was cap-  
tured from the rebels yesterday after  
anguinary fighting, which lasted all  
day. Large quantities of arms and  
ammunition fell into the hands of the  
Imperialists. The casualties among  
the latter numbered 200. The rebels  
lost 600. Two engagements were  
fought.

### A Protest.

A Hint to the Liberals About Some  
Nova Scotia Seals.

Toronto, Oct. 14.—A petition has  
been filed at Osgoode Hall against  
William A. Charlton, Liberal member  
for Norfolk in the Commons. Alex  
McCall, the defeated Conservative  
candidate, is the petitioner, and the  
charge includes almost every known  
corruption in politics. He alleges that  
both personally and through his  
agents Mr. Charlton was guilty of  
bribery, treating, personation, intima-  
tion, undue influence and various  
other practices, such as hiring auto-  
mobiles and carriages, paying the rail-  
road fares of voters temporarily away from  
the constituency and promising gov-  
ernment and other positions to people  
for voting or refraining from voting.  
This is the first protest in connection  
with the recent elections.

### THE CIGARETTE HABIT.

### Was the Victory Pre-Arranged.

Special Evening Telegram.  
PEKIN, To-Day.

A report of the Imperialistic vic-  
tory in the vicinity of Hankow has  
been received from the Minister of  
War. It has revived the drooping  
spirits of the administration. An ad-  
ditional source of comfort has been  
found in the conclusion of the loan  
agreement, which Chinese officials  
say has been arranged with a Bel-  
gian syndicate having British-French  
connections. The loan is for \$18,000-  
000, the price being 38 with 6 per cent.  
interest. The syndicate received a  
per cent. commission. One of the le-  
gations had a report from Hankow  
last night that the rebels had re-  
treated before the Imperialists with-  
out serious resistance. This creates  
the belief that Yin Tchang's victory  
may have been pre-arranged. Upon  
he receipt of the report from the war  
Minister, Yuan Shi Kai, immedi-  
ately issued orders that the railway  
traffic between Peking and Hankow be  
resumed. It is rumored among the  
Chinese that the Imperial family in-  
tended fleeing from the Capital. The  
legation advised them to remain,  
pointing out that such a show of de-  
feat only serves to make the condi-  
tions worse and the secession and up-  
rising more serious and more exten-  
sive.

### Has the Emperor Been Spirited Away.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
PEKIN, To-Day.

The situation at Peking is becom-  
ing worse. A veritable panic pre-  
vails among the Manchus. One re-  
port fixed to-night for an outbreak  
of the presence of 15,000 Chinese in-  
surrector troops against 3,000 Manchus  
the safety of the capital for the pre-  
sent. The only danger seems to be  
from a sudden attack against the  
throne or against officials who  
might precipitate a massacre of the  
Manchus. Race feeling is becoming  
intensified. Rumors are current that  
the Emperor has been spirited away  
and that Prince Ching, who is too old  
for flight, has committed suicide. The  
American legation has issued orders  
that women and children living along  
the Peking-Hankow railway, and also  
in the country to the west of the line,  
shall proceed as soon as possible to  
the coast. The Government's esti-  
mate of the rebel casualties in the  
Hankow battle is 8,000. The Govern-  
ment's success is described as being  
largely due to the work of the naval  
squadron under Admiral Sah, which  
succeeded in enlarding the rebels in  
the trenches.
