





Government Probe Dynamite Outrages.

Iron Workers' Headquarters at Indianapolis Closed and Acting Secretary Missing.

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 12.—"Who besides John J. and James B. McNamara handled or had knowledge of the inter-state shipments of the ton or more of dynamite and nitro-glycerine used in blowing up iron and steel structures erected by firms employing non-union men in the last five years."

This question was inquired into by the Government officials to-day preparatory to the resumption Thursday of the Federal Grand Jury's investigation of an alleged nation-wide dynamite conspiracy. Clerks who wrote letters, baggagemen, shippers and all those who are supposed to have had the remotest knowledge of the movement of the explosives, or where and how they were stored, are among the several hundred witnesses who have been summoned to testify before the Grand Jury. which special inquiry was made to are the following:

"Fourteen hundred and ninety pounds of dynamite discovered in a padlocked box in a barn in the rear of Orrie E. McNamara's father's home at Tiffin, Ohio, April 23, 1911."

Ninety pounds of dynamite sticks found in the basement of a building in Indianapolis in which were located the offices of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers on April 22, 1911, a few hours after the arrest of John J. McNamara, the Secretary-Treasurer of the Association.

Twenty-five pounds of nitro-glycerine dynamite found in a piano box in the western outskirts of Indianapolis a few days later.

Thirty-eight quarts of nitro-glycerine buried in a shed near Rochester, Penn.

The points upon which enlightenment was sought in connection with these instances were:

Who wrote the correspondence relative to the purchase and shipment of the explosives. Who paid the bills and kept the accounting of expenses. By what means were the explosives transported.

To all appearances the headquarters of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers were closed to-day. The shades were drawn, the doors were locked, and the whereabouts of Herbert S. Hockin, the acting secretary became a mystery. Even Hockin's attorney professed not to know where he was. The sudden closing up of the place followed closely upon the announcement that books and letters at the headquarters had been secured without resistance by detectives acting for the National Erectors Association.

Caused Panic In Theatre.

Liege, Belgium, December 11.—A dynamite bomb exploded last night during a crowded cinematograph exhibition. A panic ensued, in which fifteen persons were injured, several of them mortally. The police believe that a discharged employe threw the bomb for revenge.

Dangerous Explosives.

The Great Precautions that Have to be Taken by Workmen.

On the outside of the wrapping of frozen dynamite feathery crystals gather. These crystals are called "whiskers," and they are more "irritable" than dynamite itself. So touchy are they that anybody treading heavily near them is sufficient to set them off by concussion.

Cordite is another dangerous explosive, more so during its manufacture than after. Easy as it is to handle in its final form it is a favorite explosive with anarchists and bomb throwers. It is made from a mixture of nitro-glycerine, gun-cotton, and vaseline.

The nitro-glycerine store is a most extraordinary building, buried literally under a mound and reaching by a brick-lined passage through the earth.

Nitro-glycerine itself is an almost colorless liquid, and so careful are the men who handle it, that if a single drop falls on the leaden floor it is at once wiped up with a damp rag. All the water that comes from this underground building is carefully drained into a neighboring pond, and every week this is blown up by dynamite on account of the dangerous explosive matter contained in it.

Even in the manufacture of such a comparatively "harmless" explosive as gunpowder the greatest precautions have to be taken. On entering the building where the powder is being turned out all matches, pipes, and any steel instruments have to be taken up, and special boots have to be put on to prevent any grit reaching the soft leather floor of the buildings.

The Duke's Sword.

The sword worn by the Duke of Wellington at his most memorable victories has recently been added to the rest of the relics of the Duke preserved in the Royal United Service Museum in Whitehall. This interesting memento, a silver-handled general's sword without a scabbard, was presented by the Duke of Wellington to the Royal United Service Institution on the occasion of a visit paid by him to it in 1837.
