### Awaiting Replies.

On Saturday we pointed out that ten weeks had elapsed since the transmission of the first Memorial to His Excellency the Governor, directing his attention to the connection of one of his Ministers with certain transactions connected with the acquisition and disposal of enormous areas of timber land on the Labrador. A short time afterwards a second Memorial was presented, directing the attention of His Excellency to the text of a letter written by the Hon. Donald Morrison some weeks after he became a Minister of the Crown. The text of the letter is one of the most remarkable ones which probably ever emanated from a law officer of the Crown. We republish it because it is so long ago since we published it last in order to refresh the memory of our readers:

St. John's, Nfld.,  
April 6th, 1909.

Mr. R. W. Strong, Boston.  
Dear Strong,—Your letter of 25th ult. came duly to hand and I note contents. I hope that you will succeed as well as you anticipate in disposing of the timber properties and that before long you will have something definite to communicate to me in that direction. I enclose you a plan of the Orange Bay property, which will show its location clearly. You will notice that the land has been taken on each side of the main river and its two branches. From your experience of timber lands in Newfoundland, and particularly in that part of the country, you will know that the land in the river valleys is always the choice location for timber. The man who holds timber abutting on a river can log and drive his timber the cheapest, and until some other person locates behind him, there is nothing to prevent him from getting a good deal of timber from the adjoining Crown land. The river will furnish a satisfactory power for a small pulp operation, and I do not see, for the size of it, a better property or one that can be more easily or more cheaply worked than this Orange Bay property.

I note what you say about the electric franchise for Bonavista and Trinity, but nothing can be done in that direction until the House of Assembly meets. The House opened on March 20th, but on account of the political deadlock we could not elect a Speaker. The House was then adjourned until to-day, and it has since been postponed until Saturday next. Between this and Saturday I expect the House will be dissolved and an election proclaimed, which will take place in the early part of next month. Nothing, therefore, can be done with regard to the franchise until the House of Assembly meets and is in a position to do business. I will see if I can get hold of two copies of the charter of the Twillingate Electrical Co. and if so, will forward same to your address under separate cover.

Not only was the writer of this letter a law officer of the Crown, but since the two Memorials have been presented to His Excellency the Governor, and since Sir Edward Morris left for England, he has been Acting Premier. We are directing attention to these matters at present inasmuch as it seems not unreasonable to remind His Excellency that answers to the two Memorials are awaited.

### Opening New Organ at Wesley Church.

The very fine organ presented by the Hon. Jas. S. Pitts, C.M.G., and the Trustee Board of Cochrane Street Church, that has been erected in Wesley Church, was used in yesterday's services. From the celebrated firm, P. Conacher & Co., Huddersfield, Eng., it came for Cochrane Street Church some years ago. It contains over a thousand pipes, has eleven stops in the Great Organ, trumpet, principal, flute, chimenee, horn diapason, double open diapason, clarinet, fifteenth dulciana harmonic flute, open diapason and bourdon, and ten stops in the Small Organ: cornopean, oboe, mixture, vox celeste and others. Besides four couplers, several improvements have been added, and it will be blown by a Kinetic blower in future, which will arrive by the Stephano. Arthur Mews, Esq., who had brought out its best qualities during many years, very kindly re-opened it, and demonstrated in such a manner as only a master hand can, its rich and powerful tones, as well as its sweet seraphic notes. The Rev. Dr. Rogers delivered a very able sermon in the morning, on the influence of music, its place in the church, its association in the praise of God from earliest times; the impressiveness and majesty of orchestral music in the ritual of the temple, the grandeur of the combination of instruments and voices in the antiphonal singing of the early church, its attraction for those in agamism to the worship of God; and proceeded to speak of the magnificent effect of the music from great organs in massive Cathedrals in the cities of the world. At the close of a vivid word-picturing of the power of music when reaching the fountains of thought and feeling, fostering in the heart the sentiments of patriotism devotion and worship, he congratulated the congregation on receiving such a fine instrument; for its loyalty and aggressiveness in Christian work and service, and hoped that for many years its usefulness would be felt in the West End of the city.

At night Rev. F. R. Matthews, B.A., was the preacher, and spoke from the words in Revelation V, 8th verse: "And they sang a new song." He referred to the song of Miriam and the women of Israel after the overthrow of the Egyptians in the Red Sea. The playing upon the harp, flute, viol and other instruments by various people. Most instruments, even the piano had been brought to perfection, but the pipe organ, with all its possibilities, was not perfect yet. Its notes could resemble the voice of a weeping child or the roar of the angry waves on the rock cliffs; the gentle rustling of the summer breeze or the thunder of the tempest. But the vision of the seer had a far wider purview as he heard him sing the new "Song of Moses and the Lamb" and only those who have loved to sing the songs of Zion here can have part in the great "Hallelujah Chorus" unto "Him who hath loved us and washed us in His blood to Him be the glory forever." Though music may ponder to fashion, the great composers have all been Christians, and inspired by their theme unto outburst of glorious harmony. Education only can open the eyes of the mind, but redemption only can open the eyes of the soul and when materialism and earth's pleasures or difficulties are over, out of the discord shall involve the bliss of

### Taft's Column is Growing.

CHICAGO, To-day. More delegates of the Republican National Convention were turned in to the Taft column by the National Committee's decision upon contests from Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Roosevelt contestants lost every case in ten Georgia districts. Twenty delegates went to Taft in one blanket decision both sides agreeing. These being decided upon, same arguments had served to choose four delegates at large which had just been given Taft. Two remaining Georgia districts with their two delegates a piece soon went same way. Twenty-four delegates sixteen from Alabama and eight from Arkansas were placed on temporary roll of convention as the result of Saturday's hearings. The day's work runs up to 72 added to Taft list since taking up early this week cases upon which Roosevelt people are laying far more stress than upon those from south such cases for example as those from Indiana, which probably will be taken up this week. There still remains before these cases can be taken six delegates at large from Arizona, and the fourth congressional district California.

### Wedded in Montreal

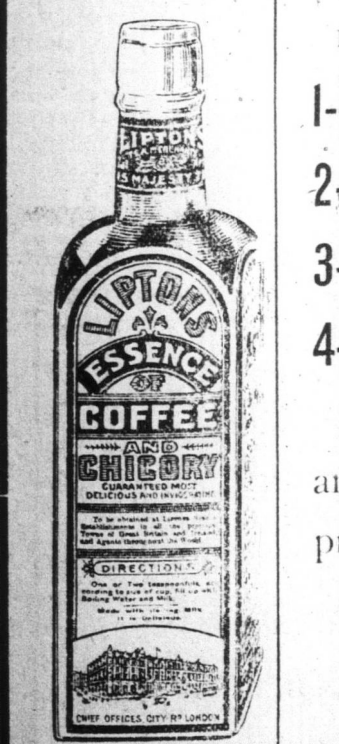
