LONDON, To-day. Winston Churchill will spend three reeks of his Christmas vacation in aris, presumably to become acuainted with new Ministers. Much nterest has been aroused as to whether Churchill's visit is connected in ny way with his recent proposals for naval holiday.

MEXICO CITY, To-day. From now until April 2nd, Huerta anization was adjourned to-day. NEW YORK To-day. The Battleships Wyoming, Arkansas, Utah and Florida came into port to-day after a voyage of nine thousand miles. They were part of a fleet that left Hampton Roads on October 25th for the Mediterranean on a trip to demonstrate that a squadron of States battleships can cross the Atlantic and return without having recourse to foreign ports for supplies. There were in all nine battleships in the fleet and not an ounce of coal, oil or provisions was purchased during their more than seven weeks absence from American shores. This is a record in the States naty, colliers and provision ships carried all necessary supplies and enough to have sustained the fleet much longer
