Frightfulness a Failure

The story of the raid by German aircraft in the Eastern counties of England, will doubtless develop as others have done, into a story of destruction of property and the lives of non-combatants. The policy of the War Office of giving no particulars as to the localities of such raids is sound, as it does not permit the Germans to learn from these visits the localities of munition works, training camps, warship yards and fortifications. There is a notable difference between the policy of the Huns and of the Entente in that respect. The Entente are using their aircraft on the bases, trenches, the fortifications, the railway communication and the submarine bases of the enemy. In these military efforts the air-fleet provided by private subscriptions in Newfoundland will take a notable part, and as the war progresses, the air-fleet provided by the Governments and such notable gifts as that of Newfoundland and the Prince of Baroda will give the Entente a notable superiority in this mode of warfare. The same contrast between a policy of frightfulness and military effectiveness is seen in submarine warfare. No such deeds as the destruction of innocent men and women on board merchantmen disgrace the record of the British Navy or their Allies. Britons unborn will have no cause to blush for such wholesale murder as that perpetrated on those aboard the Lusitania. British submarine commanders will have such proud record as the destruction of war vessels around the Heligoland bases, the penetration of the Baltic and the sinking of German warships there and in the Gulf of Riga, and such deeds against warships, transports and blowing up of bridges on lines of communication as have been accomplished in the Dardanelles, the Sea of Marmora and the harbor of Constantinople. The record of the British Navy has always been marked by humanity, and in spite of the temptation of reprisals to the German Naval men who have stood by and allowed British sailors to perish without lifting a hand to help them and jeered at them when drowning. British sailors will do nothing which will disgrace their proud escutcheon. The policy of frightfulness has no military value. It falls in its object of frightening the nation which has ever been eminent for valor and determination, and it brings everlasting disgrace on those who resort to it.

Lient Jackson Returns to the Battlefield

A cablegram was received by Mr. John Jackson yesterday informing him that his son, Lient. A. Jackson, had recovered from the wounds he received at Ypres and had left Etaples, France, the British hospital base, the day previous (Monday last) for Flanders to rejoin his regiment. He was one month under treatment, has fully recovered and, according to the message to his father, is as fit and as anxious to serve as when war broke out. It is earnestly hoped that Lient. Jackson will emerge from the battlefield with merited honours.

Poor Fishery at Labrador.

Reports from the Labrador tell that the fishery still continues to be discouraging. Latest messages received by the Marine & Fisheries Department from Cape Harrison, Macovick, Holton, Grady, Smokey, American Tackle, Domino and Battle Harbor state that there is little or no fishing being done at these places and that the weather is very backward, rain showers being frequent.

Fishery Report.

Sept. 4.—From W. White (Trouty to Port Rexton).—The total catch is 3,320 qts. and for last week 20 qts. 50 boats are fishing. Owing to the unusual scarcity of bait of any kind except mussels, practically nothing was done with cod this week.

Sept. 4. From T. Hogan (Carbonear to Western Bay).—Prospects are poor for all fishing and no squid is obtainable though there is just a sign of herring. The catch to date is 2,725 qts. with 50 for last week. Six traps and 40 punts are fishing.

Sept. 4. From J. White (Colinet Island to Head of Salmonier).—Sixty dories and skiffs and 20 boats, but no traps are fishing. There is a good sign of cod and prospects would be fairly good if bait were obtainable. There is just a sign of squid.
