## Seaweed Ammunition.

Powder From the Sad Sea Waves. The curious fact is revealed in an nteresting article in Chambers's Journal that seaweed is harvested for the purpose of making ammunition The main chemical products of seaweeds, manufactured as kelp, ar iodine and potash. In the United States, for some time past, consider able attention has been paid to ob taining potash from seaweed. "It was recently announced that the kelp crop of the Pacific Ocean is to be harveste by a powder company to obtain an in gredient used in making ammunition or the warring nations of Europe. one of the largest manufacturers of owder in the United States has de-

ded to spend a large sum in this nterprise in order to obtain potasium chloride required to fill war orlers, as it can no longer be obtained rom Germany." Seaweed, too, is of much value as a ood. The weed which grows in such bundance in the Sargasso Sea, which called "gulf-weed," is used very argely for pickling and as salads. On the coast of Pembroke a very consid-

rable industry is the gathering of laer, a seaweed used for food. The laer gatherers camp out in huts, collect ind dry the laver and send it to the Swansea market, and it is sold in the West End of London as a delicacy in rinter. "It is purple when fresh, but black

hen you buy it, and something like thin liquorice to look at. It can be nade into little rolls, dusted with oatmeal and fried. Pickled with pepper

juice, it is excellent." Dulse and tangle are two of the est-known edible seaweeds. Dulse has really been found a very valuable ood in the North, and the Icelanders boil it in milk and salt it down i casks.

Tangle or "tankle" is a well-known old-fashioned Edinburgh dainty, the young stalks being very gelatinous and nutritious.
