Britain Finds Way to Combat Zeppelin

Solved Problem as They Did That of The Submarine.

New York, Sept. 27.—The military expert of the Times says: The increasing efficiency of the London defences against aircraft has been clearly demonstrated. The invention of powerful war machines—capable of crossing a broad expanse of water and dropping destructive bombs upon a city from a tremendous height was remarkable enough. The invention of means by which these engines of destruction can be destroyed or disabled without increasing the sacrifice of life in the cities they have attacked is really a much greater achievement.

There has been no great faith hitherto, in the utility of stationary anti-aircraft guns. It was felt that if one should effectively hit its object the descent of the Zeppelin on the city, with its cargo of explosives, might cause greater destruction than the machine could cause while in the air. But the defenders brought down the two monster Zeppelins, one blazing, the other only disabled, beyond the city limits; they caused no destruction of consequence in their fall.

The work of the defenders was ably performed. There is no doubt whatever that it can be greatly improved upon. It is likely, too, that the defense does not rely entirely upon the anti-aircraft guns, of which we hear so much, while we hear next to nothing of the employment of other devices which are known to exist. The two Zeppelins destroyed may be the only ones of the twelve in Saturday night's invading fleet which reached the environs of London. The dispatches indicate that there may have been a third. But if two Zeppelins can thus be effectively overcome in mid-air, there is no reason why a dozen may not be vanquished. The British have obviously found a way to combat the Zeppelin; as they found a way to combat the submarine.

"We May Wake Up any Morning to Find That France is Free."

"The retreat from France and Belgium was sounded with the fall of Falkenhayn," says A. G. G. in the Daily News. "It may be in progress at this moment. We may wake up any morning to find that France is free, but before that let us hope that the blow on the Somme will be driven home. We do not want the enemy to secure their retreat in the West before they have sustained visible and indisputable military defeat."

"That defeat accomplished, Germany driven back upon her own soil, her allies fallen away, her people faced with a siege as complete, as inexorable as that which their armies imposed on Paris forty-six years ago, the moment will have come for considering the terms of surrender. The overtures may come from either side. If Germany makes them they will have to be made in accordance with the accomplished fact of her defeat. That fact will be so demonstrable and irrefutable that the Allies may properly take the initiative. It would be idle for them to talk of terms when the enemy are on their soil, and are pointing to 'the map' and claiming the position of conquerors."

"But when we have set the seal of defeat indisputably upon Germany, arms we can and we should disburden ourselves of any responsibility for continuing to make Europe a charnel house. We should state the terms upon which Germany may have the peace that she so criminally broke."

"Those terms will not be easy to formulate, for all the Allies have their own separate aims and look for their own particular rewards which will not always be reconciled. But there are certain principles which must govern their character and purpose. They must be terms of stern justice, but not of revenge. The full price must be exacted for the wrong that has been done; but we must do no wrong in establishing the right. The authors of the crimes against humanity and the laws of nations must be punished, whoever they are and whatever their rank, as Mr. Asquith has said, but we must not outrage any principle of nationality."

"That principle will be the sure guide in solving the problem of territory and governance, and we must take care that the Peace Congress does not repeat the crime of the Vienna Congress by settling the fate of Europe on dynastic grounds."
