**Methodist Conference
Closes.**

CARBONAR SELECTED FOR NEXT
SESSION.

MORNING.

The election of the Board of Gov-
ernors of the Methodist College was
reported to the Conference, the fol-
lowing being elected:—

The Conference then took up rou-
tine business and continued until 11
p.m., when adjournment was taken.

AFTERNOON.

The Conference opened at 2.30. Re-
ports of committees were taken up.
At 4.30 p.m. the Superintendent of
Education gave his report. The Con-
ference showed its appreciation of the
work of Dr. Curtis by passing the fol-
lowing resolution:

RESOLVED—That having heard
the report of the Superintendent of
Education, the Conference places on
record its highest appreciation of his
services to the cause of education,
and begs to assure him of its hearty
co-operation in all work pertaining to
our day schools.

The Conference also passed the fol-
lowing resolution unanimously:

RESOLVED—That this Conference
has heard with great pleasure of the
action of the Superintendent of Edu-
cation in co-operating with the other
Superintendents in holding a Teach-
ers' Summer School in this city this
July, and the Conference is of opinion
that at the earliest possible moment
the Government should provide a
normal school for the proper training
of Pupil Teachers.

Conference adjourned at 5 p.m. to
allow some committees to meet.

EVENING SESSION.

Conference resumed at 8 o'clock.
The Laymen's report was submit-
ted and business arising out of same
was considered.

The General Conference Committee
reported.

Rev. W. J. Morris was elected the
sixth delegate to the General Con-
ference, and Revs. E. Broughton and
S. Bennett elected as alternates.

Rev. Chas. Howe was elected to
visit the Holy Land under the Mac-
pherson bequest.

Conference then received the report
of the Board of Guardians of the
Methodist Orphanage. It reported Dr.
J. Allen Robinson elected Chairman
and Mr. W. G. Currie Sec. Treas.

of this Board, and gave an interesting
review of the work of the institution
for the past year.

The "Ecclesiastical" affairs were dis-
cussed. Rev. Dr. Curtis was re-ap-
pointed Editor in Chief. Rev. T. D.
Darby, Assistant Editor, Rev. H. Boyle,
Editor on Social Service, and Bryan-
gallen, and Rev. W. H. Dotchon, Busi-
ness Manager.

Rev. Chas. Leach was appointed
Financial Secretary of Executive Dis-

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Rev. Chas. Leach was appointed
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trict and Rev. S. Bennett, S. S. Sec-
retary of St. John's District, on the
resignations of Rev. Wm. Harris and
Rev. D. B. Hemmion respectively.

The Conference then decided to
hold the session of 1915 at Carbonar.
The ministerial session minutes
were then read and adopted.

A record was made of deep regret
in the death during the past year of
Rev. John W. Baggis, a probationer of
this Conference, who was killed on
active service with the Canadian
army, Revs. Coppin, Dotchon and New-
man paying tribute to his memory.

Sympathy was then expressed to Rev.
Mr. Grimes on the death during the
year of Mrs. Grimes.

The Statistical Secretary then pre-
sented his report which showed re-
cord progress in practically all de-
partments.

Two thousand three hundred and
forty-five Methodists have volunteered
for active service, an increase of over
500 for the year.

The Conference expressed its thanks
to the hosts of the Ministers, the Royal
Stores, Ltd., for services of teleph-
one, Anglo-Am. Tel. Co. for use of tel-
ephone, daily papers for the use of
space for reports, etc., and the trust-
ees of Gower St. Church for the use
of the church, etc., and the organ-
ist and choir of Conference Church for
services rendered.

The Conference also passed a resolu-
tion of thanks to Mr. F. J. King,
organist of the Presbyterian Church,
for his splendid recital given to mem-
bers of Conference on Sunday after-
noon last.

Minutes of Conference were then
read and adopted and signed by Pres-
ident and Secretary, and the Confer-
ence of 1915 closed at midnight with
devotional exercises and the National
Anthem.

The Housing Problem

Last night at a meeting of labor re-
presentatives organized by Pres. Jas.
McGrath, of the L. S. P. U., who acted
as chairman, the housing problem was
discussed, and a scheme which will be
expected to be the solution was
brought forward. Mr. Chairman Mc-

Grath in opening said the idea was to
lay the prospectus before the different
unions for the purpose of getting their
opinions and support, and it is hoped
to have the corner stone of the first
house laid on Labor Day, especially if
all co-operate. The object, he said, is
to provide homes for working classes
at a cheaper rent and of a far more
comfortable type than they at present
occupy.

The Hon. M. P. Gibbs, who next
spoke, said he felt it was one of the
most vital subjects in the country to-
day, as the foundation of the state is
the home, and if we expect a healthy
race we must provide healthy homes
for the young and growing children.

There are in this city upwards of 14,
000 people living in houses unfit for
habitation. The 5,000 men in the
unions, by subscribing 20 to 25 cents
a week towards providing themselves
homes can solve the vexing problem.

When the features of the scheme are
fully recognized and the benefits real-
ized he felt sure all would unite in
promoting it. His Excellency the Gov-
ernor, His Grace Archbishop Roche,
and others in high places have signed
their approval of the plan. His
Lordship Bishop White and Rev. Dr.
Curtis will be consulted to-day, and
their approval is also confidently ex-
pected. The plan is under the patron-
age of His Excellency the Govern-
or, and besides those mentioned
above, the Mayor, Hon. Sir Edgar
Bowering, Sir Jos. Outerbridge, Hon. J.
Harvey, Hon. John Anderson and Hon.
J. D. Ryan and other prominent citi-
zens have associated themselves with
it. Each of 6,750 by subscribing 20
cents per week would raise \$70,200
per year. The annual building expendi-
ture, say 50 houses at \$1,300 each,
would be \$65,000. It is expected that
at least 5,000 citizens not in unions
will co-operate in the scheme, so the
money can easily be secured.

The houses will be of different
grades, say 350 at \$1,200 each; 100 at
\$1,500; and 50 at \$2,000. Each mem-
ber would contribute \$10.40 a year, or
\$104.00 for the ten years, and would be
a shareholder in one of the largest
companies in the country. It is ex-
pected that a public meeting will be
held at which His Excellency and
Archbishop Roche will be present. Mr.
Jonas Barter will be the company
architect.

After passing a vote of thanks to
Hon. M. P. Gibbs, Pres. McGrath and
Hon. John Anderson, the meeting
closed.
