KING AND AN ANGRY VANMAN.

The King had an unpleasant experience the other day of one phase of the London traffic problem. His Majesty was motoring home from St. Paul's Cathedral, and as his car turned a corner at New Bridge Street (a two-horse van threatened to obstruct progress. The royal chauffeur attempted to pass, and the vanman, representing what he no doubt imagined to be an infringement of the rules of the road, expressed his opinion of the chauffeur in a vituperative volley uttered in a penetrating voice. The chauffeur ignored the angry driver, but His Majesty, who had heard every word of the tirade, turned his head sharply and gave him a disapproving glance. Whether the man was aware that he had incurred the royal displeasure is doubtful, but in any case he did not say more, and the King's car passed on its way.

RETORT TO THE KAISER.

London has kept St. George's Day (April 23) as an English festival in very quiet English manner, and in English weather hovering between fair and wet. Plenty of roses were for sale, some offered by pretty sellers for charity, some by the flower women of the West End of London. The bulky, rubimund ladies who wear shawls and straw hats as insignia of their trade. However, the majority of the people one passed in the streets wore neither rose nor flag, and I warrant a good proportion did not know that it was St. George's Day or Shakespeare's birthday. Naturally the chief aspect of the day was as the first anniversary of the Zebrugge attack, that splendid piece of daring which, although it did not fulfil our hopes and bottle up all the German submarines which were in the Flanders bases, had an amazing effect on German nerves, and made the enemy fear for his bases in the Bight. Commander Collingwood Hughes, speaking at the New Gallery on the 23rd inst., told how the Kaiser said to a British officer taken in the Zebrugge attack: "You had a hot time last night. Not so hot as you had," replied the Englishman. I saw many American soldiers in town wearing the flag with the cross of St. George. The absence of demonstrations on a national holiday puzzled them.
