Destructive Fire.

C. L. MARCH'S PREMISES BADLY DAMAGED.

At 7 o'clock this morning an alarm of fire was rung in to the Western and Central Stations, and a little later an emergency call was registered. The fire companies' response was prompt and on arrival at the scene it was found that the blaze was in the C. L. March building, top flat, and that the fire was raging furiously. Immediately the hoses were coupled up to the hydrants and streams of water sent into the burning building. Ladders were erected against the walls and the firemen spending their time knocking in the windows in order to allow free play to the water, which was thrown into the flames in copious streams. At nine o'clock the blaze had been controlled, the damage done being very considerable, as fire, smoke and water had contributed toward the injuries to building and contents. The premises of the fire company were caused by the friction of one of the mattresses making machines on the top flat by which some filters were ignited and the blaze spread so rapidly among the materials in stock that it had gone beyond the control of the workmen in a few minutes. The top store was totally gutted out and the store occupied by D. P. Pelley on the ground flat was also considerably damaged, the stock having been injured by water and smoke. Mr. March's estimate of the damage is in the vicinity of \$20,000, part of which is covered by insurance.

Shipping Notes.

T. H. Carter & Co. received a cable this morning announcing the arrival of the schooner "Smuggler," Capt. R. T. Hollett, after a quick passage of 16 days to Oporto. The schr. Ruth Hickman went into the dry dock yesterday for repairs. The s.s. Meigs arrived from Piacentia yesterday with a part cargo of freight loaded at North Sydney. She sails again Saturday and passengers leaving here by Monday morning's train will connect with her at Piacentia for points on the west coast. The s.s. Corona arrived at Clarendville yesterday with a cargo of coal to the Reid Mtd. Co. The schr. General Smuts arrived at Grand Bank yesterday from Barbados with a cargo of molasses to S. Harris, Ltd., of that place. The s.s. Graciana left here this a.m. for Halifax. The S.S. Digby is due to-morrow afternoon.

LATEST FROM NEPTUNE.—A message from the Neptune: Messrs. Job Brothers and Company last evening, stated that the Thetis towed her about five miles yesterday and that she was still in heavy ice, with the wind south-west.

Latest From Hr. Grace.

SUCCESSFUL SECOND TRIAL.

Special Evening Telegram.
HR. GRACE. This afternoon. Handley-Pake biplane made second trial flight from here this morning, taking off after a ground run of one hundred and thirty yards, and making most graceful ascent. In addition to the regular crew were the meteorological expert, Taylor, and engineer Arnold. A full supply of petrol, oil and water was on board, machine being laden to transatlantic flight capacity. Present flight will occupy about five hours, which time will be spent in making most exhaustive tests and noting air currents and other aerial conditions. After taking off at 12.20, plane circled over Harbor Grace several times, and when the proper altitude was attained headed east. Wireless was working quite satisfactorily this morning and engine gave great promise of running smoothly. The directional wireless will be fully and finally tested in to-day's flight.

BOLSHEVIK RETREAT.

COPENHAGEN, June 12. A Lithuanian official statement claims the capture of a number of places, including Kutnik, from the Bolsheviki, and says the Reds are evacuating Divinsk and retreating on Imolsk.

ANOTHER RACIAL QUESTION.

LIVERPOOL, June 12. Negroes, brought to England from Africa and other countries to serve as labor battalions, will be interned pending repatriation on account of recent race riots in England and Wales.

INDUCING FEMALE IMMIGRATION.

GUELPH, Ont., June 12. The Chamber of Commerce here is taking steps to induce immigration to Guelph of a number of British girls, one hundred for domestic service and three hundred for factories.

PEACE OF NECESSITY.

WEIMAR, June 12. Edouard Bernstein, independent Socialist leader, declared to-day before the Majority Socialists' Convention that the peace terms arose from recognized necessities, even though the conditions were hard and some unbearable. The audience shouted protest, and Bernstein replied, "I will follow the map of Eastern Germany as it is governed by language, we will see it follows, with few exceptions, the lines set by the Entente." Chancellor Scheidmann in a subsequent address ignored most of the criticisms aimed against him.

ROMANIA DISSATISFIED.

PARIS, June 13. An agreement has been reached regarding the Czecho-Slovakian frontier, but Roumania is not altogether satisfied with the boundary between that country and Hungary.

WOMAN WINS ALTITUDE RECORD.

PARIS, June 13. Baroness de la Roche, the widely known French aviatrix has captured the woman's altitude title, having reached a thousand feet higher than Ruth Law the previous record holder. Premier Orlando left for Rome last night to confer with Parliamentary leaders relative to Peace Conference work.

LET BRAZIL HAVE THEM.

RIO JANEIRO, June 13. The newspapers here bitterly attack France, because of a report that France opposes Brazil keeping former German steamers.

NEW PEACE TREATY.

PARIS, June 12. Because of Allied replies to German proposals the Peace Treaty will be entirely rewritten and reprinted. This action will render the text printed abroad obsolete.

NOTHING DOING.

WASHINGTON, June 13. Smugglers from Cuba, Canada and Mexico have been foiled in their attempts to convey liquor into the United States, under war prohibition, and officers believe that subsequent attempts will be as easily frustrated under national prohibition.

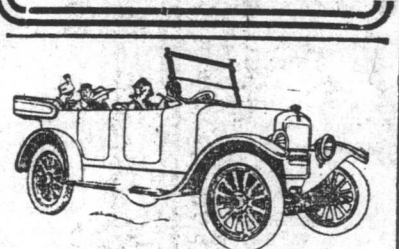

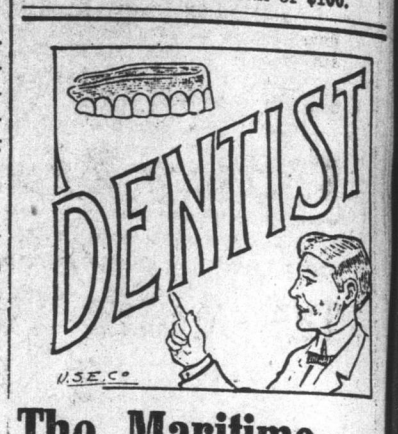
