GOWER STREET CHURCH.

A banquet was held in Gower St. Church basement last evening which was attended by the committee of one hundred having in charge the Methodist National Campaign. There are five divisions in this committee, men, young men, women, young women and older boys. One hundred persons sat down to the tables. Twelve Boy Scouts acted as waiters. After the feast the chairman, Hon. E. K. Bishop, introduced the first speaker, Rev. Dr. Fenwick, who spoke on the general aims of this great campaign. He was followed by Mr. Reuben Horwood, who brought greetings from George St. Church, and described some of the benefits that had resulted from similar campaigns in that congregation. The Pastor of the Church, Rev. E. W. Forbes, outlined the value of such work to the congregation. It was volunteer work, a demonstration of usefulness service. It was social work. There is value in getting acquainted. It was informing work. The result would be a knowledge of the constituency of the church, which would be of great value in planning the work of the church. Knowledge is power. It was seeking work. It would show the people visited that the church is interested in them. It was co-operative work. There is no value in concerted and organized effort. The organizer of the church, Mr. Albert Soper, then made a demonstration of the method of filling in a census card, and gave a lot of needed information to the workers. Cards were then distributed and assignments made to each canvasser, and the meeting was brought to a close with the Doxology and Benediction. The workers go out to call on each family in connection with the church during the next two days, and bring back the reports on the work done. Towed to Port.

The S.S. Lake Elenora, assisted by the tugs Ingraham and John Green, successfully towed the steamship Avondale to port yesterday afternoon. The Avondale has a load of oil, and was bound from Philadelphia to England, and was about 700 miles north of the Azores when trouble occurred in the engine room. The steamer drifted about for several days while attempts were being made to repair her machinery. Meeting with an American repair ship the trouble was patched up and the ship proceeded toward their destination. It was not long, however, before trouble again befell the Avondale and from calls sent out she was picked up by the S.S. Lake Elenora which was on her way to England. Both ships are owned by the United States Shipping Board.

Hydro Aeroplane Line, Newfoundland—Greenland—Iceland.

Oberleutnant Goring, the well-known "Jagd" pilot and late chief of the Jagdgeschwader von Richthofen, represented German aviation at the Copenhagen flying week and exhibition. On May 8th he left Schwerin on a Fokker D. VII with a 185 h.p. Bayer motor, and arrived at Copenhagen (250 km.) in the record time of 1½ hour.

According to "Der Motor Wagon" of June 20th, this record and his various exhibition flights made a good impression on the Copenhagen public. The German Aviation Industry can point out with pride the admiration and interest shown for German aerial technique and German aerial industry in the first foreign competition in which it enters.

In a report from Copenhagen dated July 17th, Reuter states that the Danish Minister of Justice has issued an order provisionally forbidding flying with passengers, and stipulating that foreign aviators desiring to fly to Denmark must obtain official permission. A regular air service is intended to be started between Reykjavik, the capital of Iceland, and the eastern ports of the United States.

Two hydro-aeroplanes have already been obtained and will be tested in a flight round Iceland. The route will be from Reykjavik to the southern tip of Greenland, where a station will be established; from thence to Newfoundland, and then on to the United States. The distances of the first and the second stages are roughly 600 nautical miles.—Canadian Motor Boat.

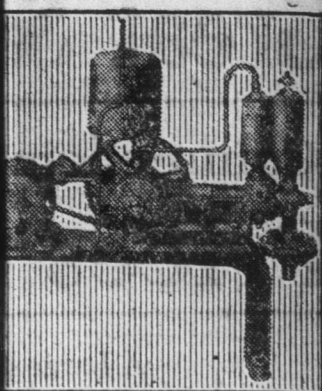
