

Methodist College Prize Distribution.

SIR JOHN CROSBIE PRESENTS AWARDS.

Sir John Crosbie presented the prizes at the Methodist College Speech Day, which was held last night in the College Hall. During the evening Sir John announced that he and Lady Crosbie would donate a \$500 scholarship in memory of their late daughter, Jean.

Hon. R. K. Bishop, Chairman of the Board of Governors, presided and in a brief speech expressed his pleasure at being present. Sir John Crosbie also made a short address. The report of the school year was then read by Mr. T. B. Harrington, M.A., the Headmaster, and proved to be a highly satisfactory one. Splendid progress had been made during the year under review, in schoolwork, whilst the college Rugby team had succeeded in winning the Challenge Shield for 1921. At the conclusion of the Headmaster's Report the prizes were presented by Sir John Crosbie, the list of which will be found appended. Sir John then made a congratulatory speech, in the course of which he humorously stated that he had never been fortunate enough to win a prize when at school. He exhorted the scholars to always play the game in life and they would never regret it. He then announced that he was offering four scholarships of \$25.00 each for the highest marks in each grade of the C.H.E., and further, that in memory of their little daughter, his wife and he were offering a scholarship of \$500, the conditions attending to which would be decided later. This statement was loudly applauded.

Rev. L. Curtis congratulated the staff and pupils on an excellent year's work. Mr. Harrington then extended the thanks of the College to Sir John Crosbie for his generous offers which would be added incentives to the pupils to strive their utmost.

The latter was splendidly presented and reflects great credit on the directing abilities of Mr. Gordon Christian, L.R.A.M., who arranged and supervised it.
