THE SITUATION.
The New York Reserve Bank Re-
discount Rate Significant—Foun-
dation Being Laid For Better
Business.

(Boston News Bureau, May 1st.)
Whatever the immediate course of
business, evidences are gathering that
foundations are being laid for sub-
stantial improvement later on. Con-
structive developments are in the
making both in domestic and foreign
fields which should have an im-
portant effect.

Temporarily production has out-
stripped consumption, causing some
curtailment in the former. Consump-
tive requirements are being held in
check by unsettledness in commodity
prices and by a widespread feeling
of caution.

Outstanding importance is the
reduction in the rediscount rate of

the New York Federal Reserve Bank
from 4 1/2% to 4%, marking the first
change by any of the reserve banks in
a long time. Such a development had
been somewhat anticipated because of
the extremely easy position of the Re-
serve System as a whole and the
plethora of funds. It is entirely in-
keeping with the general softening
of money rates.

The recent \$5,000,000 German cred-
it, forerunner of other credits and
loans to that country, and the \$40-
000,000 loan to Holland made by
America, with its enormous gold re-
serve, is destined to play in foreign
financing. Re-establishment of Euro-
pe on a stabilized economic basis is
going to mean revival of trade and
commercial intercourse sooner or
later it will mean recovery by United
States of export business in im-
portant lines.

Judge Gary of the Steel Corpora-
tion, after the directors' meeting
Tuesday, at which an extra dividend
of 50 cents per share was declared on
the common stock, expressed opinion
that the steel business would improve
immediately after election and prob-
ably a month or so before. This is
significant, and coincides with the
views of some other leaders of busi-
ness.

It is also significant that while re-
port of the Studebaker Corporation for
the first quarter of 1924 did not
measure up well in comparison with
that of the first quarter of 1923, it
did not hear out all the pessimists
on the motor industry had predicted.
President Erskine says that business
in the second quarter is proceeding
in big volume and all plants are work-
ing at capacity.

SEALING VOYAGE CLOSED—TOT- AL CATCH 129,561.

The sealing voyage for the season
of 1924 closed yesterday morning
with the landing of the Ranger's fat.
The sealing outlook which looked very
gloomy in the early part of the spring
gradually improved as the season pro-
gressed and the total turn-out of 129,561
seals, thus shows an increase of over
25,000 as compared with the official
catches during the past two years.
Eight ships prosecuted the Sealfishery
from St. John's, all of which secured
good trips with the exception of the
Viking.

"Tay Pay" Tells Real Name

Earns Big Money at 75—Is Chief
Movie Censor for Great Britain
Besides a much-sought Writer at
Substantial Rates.

T. P. O'Connor, the veteran Irish
leader in the British House of Com-
mons is enjoying a prosperous old
age, according to Barron's.

Mr. O'Connor, who is now about 75,
is the father of the House of Com-
mons. He gets around \$2,000 salary
as a member of Parliament.

Then he is chief movie censor for
Great Britain, and that post pays him
\$5,000 a year.

He writes a column for the Lon-
don Daily Telegraph, for which he re-
ceives \$12,500 a year.

As editor of T. P.'s and Cassell's
Weekly, he gets \$10,000 a year and a
portion of the profits.

Besides this he does considerable
special writing for American news-
papers at high prices.

All in all, at 75 he is a big money
earner.

Sir Henry Lucy, another famous
English journalist who died recently
worth more than a million dollars,
made the statement that it was he
who gave the familiar nickname of
"T.P." to T. P. O'Connor. This Mr.
O'Connor, however, says is entirely
inaccurate.

"As a matter of fact," he says, "I
was never called 'T. P.' until I enter-
ed the House of Commons. I don't
know that I am entitled to the name
even now. I was christened by the
name of Thomas—the name of my
father, and with none other. I was
rather disappointed with this single
and not particularly romantic name,
and longed for a better one. My
opportunity came with confirmation,
for when you are confirmed in the
Catholic church you have the right of
adding another Christian name or two
to those which you were given at
baptism. I don't know why it is that
I always had a particular affection
for two Christian names. They seemed
to me essentially romantic. One
was the name Charles, the other Ed-
mond; and I resolved that I would
add these names to the homely Thomas.
But my mother had a special rever-
ence for the name of Bernard—a
notable saint in the Catholic calen-
dar—and insisted that I should add
Bernard to my list. What happened
was that the bishop was in a bit of a
hurry. He heard only the name
Charles, which I duly got, by the
time my gasping tongue had got to
Edmond and Bernard, the bishop had
passed on to the next boy; and so I
remained with Charles, tout court."

"I was profoundly dissatisfied, and
I found a device which relieved the
situation. My mother's name was
Power. It is not uncommon among
Irishmen to take the name of their
mother, as is the universal custom in
Spain. So one day I put Power into
my name, gradually dropping the
Charles. But up to the time I entered
the House of Commons—I had just
turned thirty-two then—I had never
been called 'T.P.' If I had been I
would not have recognized it im-
mediately, as referring to me. My
friends and intimates and my family
always called me 'Tom'."

"The first time I heard myself called
'T.P.' was when a parliamentary
colleague—Lysaght Finnigan, who
had a few blazing hours of political
glory and then disappeared into early
and tragic night—shouted up to my
top room in Bernard's Inn—where I
lived—calling me 'T.P.' I recalled the
name with something like a shock.
It was so new and strange to me.
But, apparently, it caught the taste
of the House."

"But the 'Tay Pay' version of my
initials came in a different way, and
was the creation, curiously enough,
not of a friend, but an enemy. When
I first entered the House there were
still many members left to the old
Irish party; but the rise of Parnell,
the tremendous verdict of the con-
stituencies in his favor, had discredited
this older generation; they were a
pretty rotten lot—all or nearly all
looking for jobs. Among them
was a gentleman named Philip Calan.
He was extremely unpopular with the
little body of Parnellites. He re-
turned their hate, as well he might,
for they destroyed his prospects of a
big government office—the governor-
ship of Queensland—on which he had
set his heart and for which he had
pawed all his future. He capitalised
his revenue and staked everything
on his chances of this lucrative
office."

"In the debates on the Bradlaugh
case I took strongly the side that
Bradlaugh had the right to take any
form of oath his conscience dictated.
Callan thinking this an opportunity
for creating some religious bigotry
against me, attacked me in private
spoke of me as 'Tay Pay', and the
name stuck. As a matter of fact,
it is incorrect; for many Irish people
still say 'Tay' for tea; but never
'Pay' for P. But there it is."

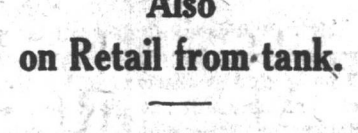
