CLAYTON BLEW UP AND BRONCHOS WON THE OPENING GAME OF W. C. L. SEASON

Three Thousand Edmontonians Saw Their Milt-Fed Pets Humbled by Frink and His Team Mates—The Score Was 5 to 3.

Edmonton, May 5.—All attendance records for this city were shattered today, when over 2,500 people turned out to Diamond Park and saw the locals defeated by the Calgary Bronchos to the tune of 5 to 3 in the opening game of the Western Canada League. The crowd overflowed onto the field and ground rules were necessary, a hit into the crowd going for two bases. The game was played under ideal weather conditions. Lieut. Gov. Bulvea threw the first ball, a perfect strike.

Calgary won the game in the first two innings. Jack Clayton, who started the twirling for the locals, walked two, hit one and threw in a wild pitch for good measure. This, with Vivian's Texas leaguer to centre was good for three runs. After the Bronchos had jumped on Clayton for another run in the second he was yanked out and Dickinson finished the game. After the second inning the game developed into a pitchers' battle between Dickinson and Frink with the local man having slightly the better of the argument.

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

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
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
