¿CONCLUSION OF M'CARTHY'S RESOLUTION.

The following is the conclusion of the resolution proposed by Mr. McCarthy on the Langevin-McGreevy scandal:

4. That as no specific charge of this nature was made against the late Minister, this House, while compelled to call attention to this view of the matter, does not think it is required to render any more definite conclusion in the matter.

In addition to the foregoing reasons the House has no hesitation in recording its opinion that, judged by the well-known constitutional rule which makes the Minister responsible to Parliament for the administration of the Department over which he presides, the late Minister of Public Works, irrespective of the considerations dealt with in the last preceding paragraph, cannot be absolved from his Ministerial responsibility, and in that regard merits the censure of this honorable Heuse.

And the House recommends that in adaddition to such action as may seem to be called for under the findings hereinbefore expressed such legal proceedings as may be available be taken against those who were concerned in the conspiracy, and for that purpose the books and papers which were before the committee be retained, or so many of them as may be necessary for such prosecution.
