London, May 31.—A dispatch from Lorenzo Marquez, dated Wednesday, "Commandant Kraus has surrendered Johannesburg to Lord Roberts."

#### BOER FORCES ABANDONED PRETORIA.

London, Thursday, May 31-3 a.m.-Yesterday at noon the British were only about two hours' march from Pretoria, and the Boer military forces will not occupy it without fighting, if had abandoned the city. This intelligence comes from the Reuter agent at Transvalal capital, and from the Earl of Rosslyn in a press dispatch. The two messages left about the same time. At 2 o'clock this morning the war office had received no news from Lord Roberts which the officials would make public; but it is assumed that the press advices are correct.

Most of the London morning papers. through the courtesy of the Daily Mail, prints Lord Rosslyn's dispatch, and comment upon it, treating the war as ended. Some of the more cautions critics think that guerilla warfare is likely to be carried on for some time in various parts of the conquered territory. Although the Boer forces are dissolving, Lord Roberts apparently has not yet taken any considerable quantities of artillery, arms or stores. Large bodies of Boers must still be somewhere in the field.

KRUGER'S REFUGE. Watervalboven or Waterfallboven is 130 miles due east of Pretoria, on the Delagoa Bay Railway. It should not be confuesed with Waterval, ten miles north of Pretoria, where the British prisoners are. Watervalboven is a small place, in a mountainous couning evidence that the annexation of try. PRACTICALLY OVER. The Times says this morning: "The war is practically over. By this time the British flag is flying in Pretoria. Mr. Kruger has fled, and is ere this way to Delagoa Bay. Mr. Hay, son of the United States secretary of state, who holds the office of American consul at Pretoria, and who, in that capacity, took charge of our in-terests, thoughtfully insisted on a special step for safeguarding the large number of British prisoners."

EXODUS FROM PRETORIA. A dispatch from Lorenzo Marquez, dated Wednesday, says: "By tonight's train from Pretoria, arrived a few Greeks, who say they were told to leave Pretoria Tuesday. They affirm that the train in which they left was shelled by the British, and that half of the train was cut off, the remain-der steaming away. This incident probably occurred at Elandsfontein Junction. Passengers from Pretoria assert that the town is utterly demor-

alized. There is a mad rush for the

coast. Five trainloads of fugitives are expected here tonight." Two Australians, who escaped from Pretoria on April 28 have arrived at Mafeking, having spent a month on the veldt with but little food and no blankets. They slept by day and marched at night. They complain biterly of the treatment at Pretoria. It is reported that a special train from Pretoria, on April 28, with fu-gitives, was derailed on the Transvaal side of the Komatipoort, a number of passengers being killed or injured.

ELSEWHERE.

Events elsewhere in the field of war seem to dwindle in comparison. Gen. Hunter re-entered the Transvaal at Maribogopan Tuesday. The advance was made off the railway. Water is scarce and all the farms are deserted. Yesterday Gen. Hunter reached Geysdorp with ten days' supplies. Maribogopan is half-way between Vryburg and Mafeking. Geysdorp is from 12 to 15 miles east. Gen. Hunter meets with no resistance. Gen. Baden-Powell is invading further north without opposition. Commandant Snyman having gone toward Pretoria.

PORTUGAL'S ACTION.

Lorenzo, Marquez, Wednesday after-noon, May 30.—Goods traffic between here and the Transvaal was officially closed today, the reason apparently being the military movements in progress. A Boer commando has arrived at Komatipoort. All the Portuguese troops have been ordered to be in readiness to proceed to the frontier, and the Portuguese fleet along the

coast has received orders to concentrate here. The Lorenzo Marquez correspondents think the border trouble be-tween the Transvaal and Portuguese may come to a head at any moment. Komati bridge is strongly defended. Yesterday the Portuguese authorities were preparing to resist a possible engagement. A mule battery was sent to the frontier. The Lorenzo Marques. correspondent of the Times says: "16 would not be surprising if a large proportion of the rebel Dutch sought temporary refuge on Portuguese terri-tory. Although the authorities here tory. are reticent, they are not blind to such

a possibility."

THE YEOMANRY.
