Work and Wages.

At the Great Northern general offices, Minneapolis, it is learned that President J. J. Hill has acceded to the demands of labor unions in the North-western States and will dispense with Japanese labor in the shops and on the road. There were about 2,000 Orientals thus employed. The Japanese performed less work in a day than their white companions, but they received less pay.

Some of the machinists employed by the Detroit Brass and Iron Works have been asked to accept a lower wage than they have been receiving. Sidney Corbett, Jr., & Co.'s New York wire says: "Some of the beautiful of the recent consolidations are becoming apparent. Estimates by prominent railroad men of the number of persons whose services will be dispensed with on account of the great number of consolidations vary from 25,000 to 75,000."

About 30 employees of the Walkerville Match Company have struck for better wages.

Every silk mill in the Lawrence Valley is idle by reason of strikes, excepting the Klotz mill at Carbondale, where the employees continue working pending the arbitration of difficulties by Rev. Father Coffey. There are 4,500 girls and men on strike, and they show every determination to remain out until they receive an increase in wages.

The Fire Record.

Georgetown, Ont., Feb. 13.—The most disastrous fire here in years occurred Saturday, when at 2:30 o'clock it was discovered that the Presbyterian Church was on fire. Despite the best efforts of the firemen the church was completely gutted and the roof destroyed. The loss will probably be covered by the insurance, which is \$6,000 on the church and \$1,500 on the contents.

An attempt was made Saturday morning to set fire to C. B. Allison & Co.'s block, in Picton, Ont. M. Roblin discovered the fire, which had been started in the hallway of the block, and put it out with little difficulty.

A blaze in the dry kiln in Coates' mill, Ridgeway, Saturday, did about \$300 damage.

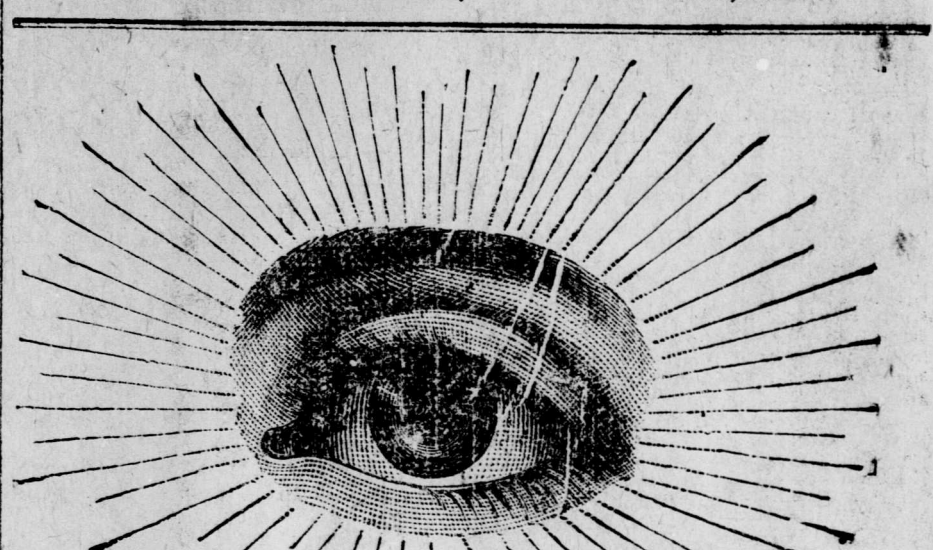

PTE. COLE HONORED

By the Commercial Travelers Association—Presented With an Address, Gold Locket and Chain.

The Western Ontario Commercial Travelers' Association held a special meeting on Saturday afternoon for the purpose of doing honor to Mr. Frank J. Coles, a member of the association who did service with the first Canadian contingent in South Africa. The meeting was called by order of Mr. W. L. Underwood, the president of the association, who, in explaining the object of the gathering, said that he could assure Mr. Coles that every member of the association was proud to know that one of their number had fought to obtain for those in South Africa the same privileges and rights that all enjoyed in this country as British subjects.

Mr. Underwood called upon Mr. Alf. Robinson, the secretary of the association, who read the following address to Mr. Coles:

"To Frank J. Coles, Esq., city: Dear Sir—The members of the Western Ontario Commercial Travelers' Association beg to express their great pleasure at your safe return from South Africa."

"It will always be a source of pride to know and remember that this association was so worthily represented in the Royal Canadian contingent which took part in the great conflict precipitated by the Boer leaders in South Africa, and in the resolute and determined undertaking of the British empire to obtain and maintain in that country equal rights and liberties for all white men and justice and protection for all."

"It is eminently satisfactory to know that the tremendous sacrifices entailed on the whole empire by this struggle will not have been made in vain, but that in a comparatively short time the whole of the disturbed states will be united in one great confederacy, similar to that of our own Dominion of Canada, which we earnestly believe to be the best and truest form of self-government in the world, and under which the best results are and will be obtained."

"We also take this opportunity of expressing our great sorrow at the death of our late beloved Queen and of our loyalty and devotion to her son and successor, King Edward VII., who we have full hope and confidence will worthily walk in the footsteps of his illustrious mother and predecessor."

"We beg of your acceptance of the accompanying chain and locket as a slight token of our gratitude for the honor conferred upon us by your services to our common country and empire."

"Signed on behalf of the association, W. L. Underwood, president; Alf. Robinson, secretary; William Turnbull and T. P. Blackwell, vice-presidents; Samuel Munro, treasurer—London, Ont., Feb. 16, 1901."

The locket and chain accompanying the address were of solid gold. In the center of the obverse side of the locket was a beautiful diamond and on the reverse side were engraved the initials of the recipient. On the inside of the locket was the following inscription: "Presented to Frank J. Coles by the Commercial Travelers' Association, London."

Mr. Coles suitably acknowledged the kindness of the travelers on this occasion, and he also took advantage of the opportunity to thank the association for the grant of \$50 made to him while he was at the seat of trouble.

A meeting of the association and the Travelers' Mutual Benefit Society was held after the presentation, when special votes of thanks were passed to Mr. and Mrs. McKellar, of the McKellar House, Glencoe, for the great kindness and attention shown to the late Mr. Wm. Martin, traveler formerly of the association, during the fatal illness which overtook him while on a business trip to Glencoe. Another resolution expressed the deep sense of gratitude felt by the travelers for the kind and unselfish care taken by Mr. and Mrs. McKellar of a number of other members of the association who were overtaken by illness while in Glencoe lately.
