OPENING UP THE COUNTRY'S RESOURCES

Iron Excitement at Steep Rock Lake—Operations of Neipigon Pulp Co.

Toronto, Nov. 18.—The bureau of mines has received word that an iron excitement is in progress at Steep Rock Lake, on the line of the Canadian Northern, between Port Arthur and Port Francis. The deposit is understood to be a continuation of the Atikokan range. Several thousand acres have been applied for. The Neipigon Pulp and Paper Company, which last year obtained a concession from the Ontario government, has leased a water power site on the Neipigon River twelve miles above Lake Superior, known as Cameron's Pool. The company has had an engineer on the spot, and on Saturday the crown lands department received word from the company that it had acquired several lots, on which it intends to establish a mill as soon as possible.

A \$60,000 ROBBERY.

New York, Nov. 16.—Defalcations amounting to \$60,000, have been discovered in the accounts of the Williamsburg Savings Bank. Gen. J. V. Meserole, president of the bank, is the authority for the statement that the parties implicated are Harry D. Corbett, former paying teller of the bank, who died Nov. 2, and George Zollinhofer, a receiving teller, who is alleged, gave the first information leading to the discovery. Harry D. Corbett had been in the employ of the bank for 18 years. He was looked upon as a man of exemplary habits, and not the slightest suspicion attached to him up to the time of his death. Zollinhofer, it is stated, has confessed, and he and Corbett for the past two or three years had taken funds from the institution for the purpose of stock gambling, and that so far as he could estimate the amount that had been lost was between \$50,000 and \$60,000.

UNEXPECTED PROMPTNESS

Characterized the Settlement of the Dispute Between France and Turkey.

Ancient City of Erzeroum Visited by Earthquake—A Thousand Houses Destroyed—Fifteen Thousand People Homeless—A Romance of the South African War—Diss De Barr's Trial—Large Increase in Membership of British Labor Unions.

London, Nov. 18.—The settlement of the Franco-Turkish dispute came with unexpected promptness. The reason must be sought in the action of the other powers, especially of the Triple Alliance.

M. Delcasse, the French foreign minister, has scored a distinct triumph, but at the same time he has gone back on the definite declaration of France to accept nothing less than satisfaction for the demands before she would leave Mitylene. The sultan's promises cannot reasonably be regarded as more than a satisfactory kind of guarantee. Admiral Caillaud, however, is still with his squadron in Turkish waters. The powers, there is good reason for stating, secured from M. Delcasse binding pledges to abandon the demand of a material guarantee from Turkey and to withdraw Admiral Caillaud as soon as the port publicly promised to concede all the French demands. At the same time the powers undertook to bring every pressure to bear upon the sultan, who, however, is still with his squadron in Turkish waters. The result of all this will undoubtedly be to reduce Germany's influence at Constantinople, which for some time has been predominant, and to exclude French influence, which has been practically null, thus restoring more or less the old position in Turkey, as regards external affairs.

For France the result is distinctly beneficial. It will remove one of the weakest points of the republic in the eyes of Frenchmen, the lack of external reputation and prestige in Europe. Thus the present government and the Republican party have been greatly strengthened for the coming election.

EARTHQUAKE IN TURKEY.
Welland, N. Z., Nov. 18.—An earthquake in Canterbury district has devastated the township of Cheviot. Many people have been injured. London, Nov. 18.—A cable message from Erzeroum, Turkey, announces the partial destruction by earthquake of that old city, with a loss of several lives. The dispatch is signed by Mr. Stapleton, an American missionary, is as follows:

"Erzeroum, Turkey, just visited by earthquake. One thousand houses wrecked and 1,500 damaged. It is known that several were killed. Fifteen thousand people, who have been driven to huts for shelter, are in need of relief. The winter is coming in severe. Contributions can be remitted to the American Bible House, Constantinople. One hundred and fifty thousand dollars are needed for immediate relief."

Erzeroum is the principal city of Armenia, in Asiatic Turkey, capital of a vilayet of the same name, and is an elevated plain on the west branch of the Euphrates, 155 miles west of Mount Ararat. It is partly inclosed by a wall 30 feet high, and has an extensive citadel. The population is estimated at from 60,000 to 100,000. Erzeroum was founded about 415, near the site of the ancient Arze, under the name of Theodosiopolis, and it was the bulwark of Armenia under the Byzantines. The Turks regard it as an important military post. The winter and spring climate is severe.

a curious little war story, is that told this week by the Pelican. It began with excitement, became pathetic, ended happily; indeed, became quite comical, if not a farce, at the finish. Both had been wounded, but while one had recovered, one had, as reported, died. 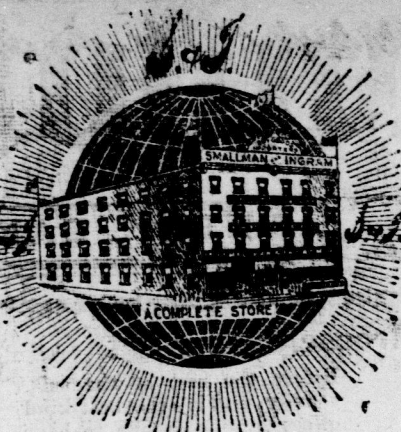
QUEEN WILHELMINA BETTER.

GERMAN WORKINGMEN WILL SUFFER.
A Berlin dispatch says: All signs indicate that there will be much suffering among the working classes in Germany this winter. The authorities of this city estimate that there are 25,000 unemployed persons in Berlin, and from all sections of the country come reports of people seeking work. Statistics show that an average of two persons are traced for every vacant job in October and the number of unemployed has increased since then, several iron furnaces and other establishments having recently discharged men. The various German states have begun investigating the number of people unemployed, preparatory to establishing relief works. Committees are collecting funds in Berlin for opening soup houses.

MISS STONE'S RANSOM.
The brigands who captured Miss Ellen M. Stone and Mme. Tsiska have reduced the amount of ransom they demand to £20,000, Turkish. Two deaths were recently certified to in Odessa as due to the bubonic plague. Havana's municipal council has awarded the contract to pave and sewer Havana at \$10,913,853 06.

Paris La Liberté asserts that two million francs' worth of deteriorated American tinneed foods have been discharged among the military stores at Verdun, France.

The French minister of education is preparing plans for the reform of the method of teaching English, German and other foreign languages in the colleges. Syntax and philology will give way to conversations, stories and oral exercises.

After a fierce fight Saturday, the Lutheran students drove the Roman Catholic students out of the great hall of the university at Vienna. The authorities of the university brought the Catholics back to the hall, but the latter were again driven out. The fighting between the students continued outside the building.

The Chinese Empress Dowager has issued another edict enjoining the late Li Hung Chang and ordering the erection of a memorial arch near his birthplace. The edict also directs that the rank of marquis, conferred upon the oldest son of the late Li, shall descend through 22 generations. It confers high rank upon the other sons of Earl Li, upon whom the posthumous rank of a marquis had been bestowed.
