CHELSEA GREEN WILL BE KEPT AS A MODEL VILLAGE

County Councilors Visit Site of Proposed New Suburb Near McClary Works.

Chelsea Green is an ideal spot for a suburb of the city of London, and one day it will be a prosperous and model village of workmen's families. This was the general opinion of the council and the county council, who visited the place yesterday prior to taking into consideration the erection of a bridge at the foot of Adelaide street. The council was fully attended, it having sat at 1:30 o'clock, and after a brief business session having gone in a body to Victoria Hospital.

Here Supt. Heard had the visitors divided into three companies and a thorough inspection was made. The various departments were visited, and the work explained. The utmost satisfaction with the general management of the institution was expressed by the councilors.

Conveyances took the party first to the new McClary works at the foot of William and Adelaide streets. After an inspection of this place, Mr. White, of the London Rolling Mills Company, Col. Gartschore and Mr. Alex. Stuart, conducted them across the river to the site of the proposed suburb. Contractor Dudley was found here busy with the work on the construction of sewers. The councilors were shown the plan of Chelsea, with a continuation of Adelaide street. Work is being done on this at the time. It will be opened to the Vauxhall road, and the road will be laid out. There is one street to the east and two to the west, parallel with Adelaide street, and crossing these the plan provides for half a dozen streets, some of which are being laid out.

The situation is admirable. To the north and east will be the river, while the country to the west and south is unsurpassed. The lots are nicely divided off.

COUNCILORS INTERESTED.

The county's representatives at once became interested in the project, and were pleased with many questions. The latter explained that the whole property was in the hands of the land company, the principals of which were the men interested in the rolling mills and the McClary works. These two places would soon employ several hundred men, and accommodation would be afforded for them here. The company did not intend building houses and renting them, nor would any of the land be rented. They would build to supply homes for the workmen on easy terms. A man could buy one of the lots and the company would build a house for him, which he could pay in instalments. Drains and sidewalks would be constructed by the company, so the cost of these would be included in the cost of the houses. While they would dispose of the land to anyone, they would require assurance that the purchaser was going to build. Furthermore, they would provide that certain things should not be built. For instance, one thing the company had decided upon was that no liquor shall be sold in Chelsea. The council was pleased with the outlook, and the manager of the McClary Company expressed his hopes that in the near future they would see a model and pretty-kept village there.

To get to this desirable location it was readily seen a bridge is necessary in place of the footbridge now spanning the river. The proper thing, of course, would be to make this bridge a public one by having it at Adelaide street. If the county should build one here it would cost about \$12,000 or \$14,000, which the companies would assist.

However, it would take the place of the Vauxhall bridge, less than a mile up the river, for the latter is in a condemned state. If the Adelaide street bridge were not built a new one would soon have to be put up in place of the present Vauxhall bridge.

After an interesting inspection of the London Rolling Mills, the party was driven around to the Vauxhall bridge and no one disputed that it was in bad shape. To close it, it was seen, would only require the removal of three lots, so that the road to Adelaide street bridge could be reached. This is what the county councilors had already agreed to do. The trip was an instructive one, and was much enjoyed by the council, who will now be able to deal with the matter in a more intelligent manner.

CORNER-STONE PROUDFOOT MEMORIAL CHAPEL WAS LAID

It will be opened free of debt. At least, that is the intention of the committee. The contract price for the work is \$1,600, but, with the extras that are sure to be added, the amount may reach \$200 more. The subscription list has already reached the sum of \$1,400, and before the opening on Sept. 1 it is confidently anticipated that the full amount will be in the hands of the committee. The subscriptions have not only come from members of St. Andrew's Church, but from others in and out of the city. A former Londoner, now in Portland, Me., sent a sum of \$500. The building was a matter which gave the greatest trouble, but it is so, for I think the regular church should be the church for the children as well as the men and women. CHURCH IS TO REMAIN IN CONTROL OF CONGREGATION

St. James, Montreal, Will Not Have to Be Sold for Debt.

The London Conference Gave Nearly \$7,000 to Save It.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Wingham, June 4.—The London Methodist conference opened yesterday morning with a religious service conducted by Evangelist McD. Kerr, of Toronto. Rev. J. W. Graham, of St. James Church, Montreal, addressed the conference relative to the effort to meet the great debt on that property, which he said, has been successful, and the church is now assured to be within the control of the congregation. The London Conference has contributed nearly \$7,000 to the relief of that property.

Rev. Dr. Briggs presented the report of the book and printing establishment, Toronto. The report showed continued prosperity and the grant of \$12,000 from the profits to the superannuation fund.

Dr. Briggs was followed by the editor of the Guardian, Rev. G. J. Bond, M.A. This is Mr. Bond's first appearance at the London Conference, and he made an earnest appeal for the extension of the patronage of the church paper, owing to the increase in cost of material and wages. Mr. Bond expressed the conviction that the constituency of the Guardian must be

greatly extended, or, failing that, the subscription price of the paper must be advanced. At the suggestion of Rev. Dr. Gundy, a plan for increasing the subscription price of the paper was submitted to the people through the district meetings and church boards. The following named young men were members of the conference: McKim, C. W. Coulter and H. Fowler, B.A., W. Kellam, R. J. McCormick, B.A., J. W. Kitchin, Charles J. McKim, C. W. Coulter and H. Fowler, B.A., William H. Coulter, formerly a minister with the disciples, made application to be received as a probationer, and was granted standing as having traveled three years and recommended by the conference.

Revs. Thomas Mason, Alfred Andrews, W. Quance and Edward Kershaw were recommended to be placed on the superannuation list, at their own request.

The case of Rev. J. B. Freeman, at one time a Presbyterian minister, and now seeking admission into the Methodist ministry, was referred to a special committee for consideration.

Rev. Dr. Young read the pastoral address, which is to be read in all the churches as soon after conference as possible.

A most enthusiastic temperance meeting was held on Wednesday evening. The president was in the chair, and addresses of exceptional interest were given by Revs. J. W. Graham, C. W. Coulter, and Rev. J. H. Oliver, of Listowel. Besides the fine music of the choir, Revs. Millson and Moir sang two duets.

NEW CARS ARRIVE

Latest Additions to Street Railway Service Are Well Equipped.
