BRITISH ARMY STORES SCANDAL

By Sales and Refunds the British Taxpayers Lost Millions.

London, July 6.—The report of Gen. Butler's committee of investigation into the South African stores department is a scathing condemnation of war office methods, or lack of them, in dealing with contractors. In the summing up the committee says: "Some clumsy pantaloons in putties, even some agile harlequin in a helmet," may occasionally be caught, but the oldest member of the committee has informed his colleagues that in the course of many years' experience he can only call to mind one case where the civil practitioner in a military scandal has been brought to justice.

The minutes of evidence hold many proofs that the general was not only thousands of pounds, the granting of rebates or refunds, and the acceptance of a contractor's representation without query or comment, were regarded as ordinary occurrences in every-day administration, worthy of less attention than would have been bestowed upon a few pounds or shillings in a similar situation at home.

The report explains that in June, 1902, when the war was being waged, there was accumulated by the military authorities food sufficient to feed 300,000 men and 200,000 horses for four months; and as it became necessary to sell all surplus stores, Lord Kitchener suggested on June 18 the creation of a special department, under Col. Morgan and the Army Service Corps. The money involved, he suggested, would probably reach some £5,000,000 or £7,000,000.

Lord Kitchener left South Africa on June 23.

Those millions were never realized, however, for the surplus, plus but a few pounds, were sold at "absurdly low prices." In some cases they did not cover the cost of the stores.

A dual system of sales was set up—a system under which the army would concurrently sell with one hand and buy with the other the same article or a similar description of the same article. . . . and these concurrent dealings were to be worked by the Army Service Corps, under Col. Morgan as director of sales, as well as director of supplies.

Meyer & Co. stood almost alone in the field of tender.

Col. Hipwell, who succeeded Col. Morgan and Capt. Limond, are also censured.

There can be little doubt that an extensive loss or destruction of documents has taken place; and in the evidence given by the officers and non-commissioned officers who were connected with the director of supplies' office, the fact that the same memories are more the rule than the exception whenever the salient or critical points of any question are reached.

The committee is of opinion that a grave error was made in not sending a specially trained officer of high rank, and a small but very capable staff of civil and military officials to South Africa after the war to take in hand the business of winding up the war, and replace the haphazard and always wasteful ways of war by the regular methods of peace administration.

FOUND PIRATE TREASURE

\$1,000 of Capt. Kidd's Gold Dug Up On Long Island.

New York, July 5.—An iron box filled with Spanish gold had been dug out of the ground at Riverhead, L. I., and the story at once grew that it was buried there by Captain Kidd, the pirate. It is certain, however, that it was buried more than a century ago. It was found by men engaged in tearing down the old Ostrander mansion that is more than 100 years old. A passageway was discovered leading from the cellar straight to the box. The entrance was hidden by a large stone.

The coins were carried to the First National Bank, where they were declared to be worth about \$1,000. The Ostrander property was sold to Sheriff H. H. Preston and G. Frank Howell. The box was buried close to the line dividing the property of the two owners. The find will probably be divided between them.

LIKE THE ASTOR TRAMP

Negro Who Broke Into House Took Nothing But a Sleep.

Stamford, Conn., July 6.—According to his statement to the police, Marion Terrell, a negro tramp, was moved by motives similar to those which possessed the famous Astor tramp when he forced an entrance to the residence of Thomas K. Milliken, of Henry street, a wealthy manufacturer of linens in New York. Mr. Milliken and his family are touring in Europe, and the place is in charge of a caretaker, Terrell explored the house and finally reached Mrs. Milliken's boudoir. His magnificence made him sleepy, he told the police. He dozed off and went to sleep on the downy canopied couch.

Next night he returned and was proceeding to take another sleep, when a special officer watching for him appeared. Terrell fled, but was recognized, and was afterward captured by Policeman Heffernan. The Milliken family escaped by leaving from a window thirty feet from the ground, but was recaptured subsequently in Sound Beach. Then he made a confession that he had stolen no article of value, but was charged with statutory burglary and was bound over to the superior court for trial.

MINING DISASTER

Nine Men Die by Gas Explosion in Virginian Mine.

Roanoke, Va., July 5.—A disastrous explosion occurred in Vivian, W. Va., coal mines, at Vivian, W. Va., today, causing the instant death of nine men and the injuries of four others. The details are very meager, but it is known that in addition to the nine dead, fifteen have been rescued in a dying condition. There are 30 more men in the mines, and it is almost certain that they have perished. A special Norfolk and Western train is being rushed to the mine to take the wounded to the company's hospital at Welch, W. Va. The cause of the explosion is not known, but the impression prevails that it was due to an accumulation of gas. This is one of the worst explosions in the history of the West Virginia coal fields.

EUROPE TO IGNORE RUSSIA AS POWER

Weakness of Russia Will Cause New Alliances.

END OF DREAM OF THE SLAV

Hope of Absorbing Many Small States and Thus Reaching Outlet On Mediterranean Is Gone.

Washington, D. C., July 5. — While the war with Japan has ruined Russia's prestige in the far east, the revolutionary outbreak in the Black Sea, the disturbed conditions throughout the Slav Empire have destroyed the influence of the Czar in European councils.

A new adjustment of international relations in the old world is impending—in fact, has already begun—and the stable powers, including the United States, are considering policies that must adapt to meet the changed conditions.

Diplomats who discussed today the effect of the disturbances in Russia did not let it be understood that their governments are making preparations in anticipation of the overthrow of the autocracy.

If such an event were to occur—and it is regarded today more probable than the Russian Revolution, which would be a very large extent the course each nation will follow. What has received international recognition at this moment is the passing of Russia as a factor in the Mediterranean and Balkan question, particularly, and the prospect is that she will be counted out in connection with other problems which ultimately have concerned Europe in the past.

Confession of Impotence.

The appearance of the Russian battleship Kniaz Potemkin in the hands of revolutionists at the Roumanian port of Kustendji and the inability of the St. Petersburg Government to prevent its departure is a confession of the Russian fleet's weakness.

It has been the dream of the Pan-Slavists that Russia would some day extend her sway over Roumania, Bulgaria, Serbia, and Austria, and the Straits of Bosphorus and the Dardanelles. An outlet from the Mediterranean was the object, and to insure its accomplishment Russian intrigue was constantly at work to maintain a condition of affairs which at any moment might be turned to advantage.

It was pointed out today that just before the Japanese warships fired on the Russian fleet at Port Arthur there was grave danger of war between Bulgaria and Turkey over Macedonia. Russia's policy was to prevent this, and to maintain it the powers gave a mandate to Russia, and to Austria, in 1877, under which they were to take such action as might be necessary to prevent war.

Austria has internal weaknesses which everyone predicts will develop into a revolution, and the emperor, Franz Josef, dies. Turkey has been the "sick man" for more than half a century.

According to what was said today Germany was the first to profit by Russia's deplorable state. Appreciating the inability of the Czar to come to the aid of Roumania, Russia's ally in the Moroccan question, which France and Great Britain had settled to their mutual satisfaction, and in view of the latest developments in the Slav Empire, it is believed here that he will continue to insist that his views for a conference shall be adopted.

Harvon von Stieritz, the German ambassador, will see the President tomorrow at Oyster Bay and is expected to assure him that a peaceful adjustment of the Moroccan question will take place.

M. Jusserand, the French ambassador, who had expected to sail on the 15th for France, is still in London, and his hesitation which marks the execution of his plans has aroused comment in diplomatic circles.

Germany has been circumspect in dealing with the Balkan question, but has been strengthening carefully her relations with Turkey. She has expressed her regard for Russia, and to Persia, to the manifest dissatisfaction of Russia, which had hoped to dominate the land of the Shah, and of Great Britain, which had hoped to see her road to India menaced by either Russia or Germany. Turkey would like nothing better than a free hand in the Balkans, and would like to make short work of that principality, provided other powers did not interfere.

Attitude of England and France.

Great Britain and France are the two powers in Europe, it is said here, that are certain to remain firm in the face of the status quo. Great Britain views with apprehension the policy of Germany, because she regards it as a policy of aggression. The increase in German strength is accepted as a menace to British interests.

While the London authorities want Russia weakened, broken up into small states, perhaps, because the safety of India would then be assured, no diplomat in Washington believes they would like the overthrow of a constitution which would enable German expansion at Russian expense.

France, on the other hand, would object seriously to the overthrow of the present Government of Russia or any grave weakening of its power for political and financial reasons. The French people have regard for Russia as a greater safeguard against German aggression than England, because England could aid France only upon the sea, while Russia could throw into Germany a force greater than that country could raise. Moreover, the French are large holders of Russia's public debt and would be enormously in case of a successful revolution in the empire of their ally.

It is this changed European situation which is responsible for the prospective success of the latest negotiations for an armistice instituted by the president. Russia now recognizes that she cannot stand another serious defeat in Manchuria, France, as well as the United States, has been urging her to accept the inevitable and reach an agreement with the Japanese for the suspension of hostilities pending negotiations of a treaty of peace.

Great Britain is in a difficult position in discussing Russia with Japan, but the latter does not wish Germany, according to what is known here, to attain greater power, even though Russia be the sufferer. Therefore, Japan has displayed more willingness to lend an ear to the idea of an armistice, which at first was repugnant to her.

Japan knows that Russia must sign a treaty of peace, whatever the terms, but it is said that in spite of the weak position of her adversary she will not take advantage of it. It was reiterated today that her terms will be
