Pittsburg, Sept. 6.—Manager Fred Clarke, of the Pittsburgh team, has received an offer to take a team of ball players to the Orient at the close of the baseball season, providing Pittsburgh wins the pennant. Two teams are to be taken, according to the proposition, that has been made to Clarke by a New York theatrical man, and Clarke will have the privilege of choosing them from the National and American League clubs.
The information given out here is that no restriction will be placed on Clarke's choice of players, save that he include some from the winning teams of both leagues this year. New York and Chicago teams are also to have representation. The idea is to sail from San Francisco immediately after the world's series has been completed, with all players in good condition, and it is understood that the backers are to pay salaries during a three-months' trip. Thirty men are to be taken. Clarke has sent word that he will not consider any proposition until after the winner of the National League pennant is definitely known.
