DR. ENGLISH UNDER FIRE

OVER TYPHOID OUTBREAK

Hamilton Spectator Claims That Epidemic Was Not Reported—Water Tanks Said To Be Unclean.

The Hamilton Spectator of Wednesday says:

That the epidemic of typhoid fever at the local hospital for the insane, which broke out over a month ago, and has filled the asylum hospital with patients and employees who contracted the dread disease, has never been reported to the provincial authorities, was discovered by the Spectator this morning.

Provincial Inspector E. R. Rogers, at Toronto, was called up by phone, and stated that he had received no word whatever as to the outbreak.

The following is the conversation which took place between Inspector Rogers and a Spectator reporter:

"Is it right, inspector, that the provincial department of prisons and asylums intends to make an investigation into the outbreak at the local asylum?"

"What outbreak is that?"

"According to the local asylum authorities a large number of employees and patients have contracted typhoid fever, and Dr. E. F. Jeffries, of the local staff, succumbed to the disease yesterday afternoon."

"I have received no report from Hamilton to that effect; when I do, it will be time to make an investigation."

was the reply of Inspector Rogers. The doctor stated that Dr. R. W. Bruce Smith, chief inspector of prisons and public charities, was out of the city, and could not therefore be seen in regard to the question. At the same time, he intimated that as soon as a report was received from the local authorities an investigation would be ordered.

Claims Report Was Sent.

In conversation with Dr. English over the phone this morning, the medical superintendent told a Spectator reporter emphatically that he had sent a report to Toronto, and when informed of what Inspector Rogers had said, the doctor stated he had no wish to clash with the inspector on such a matter.

Whether or not Dr. English intends to make a personal investigation in the matter could not be ascertained this morning, as the doctor, otherwise than admitting he had sent a report to
