In the meantime the list of victims is increasing. Yesterday afternoon had received no word whatever as no fewer than five patients were taken from their respective wards and placed in the asylum hospital suffering from typhoid. This will bring the total number up to near the twenty mark, and there are no signs that the authorities are in control of the situa-tion. At first it was thought that the ice supply was the cause of the outbreak, but a new feature has been introduced. It has been learned that the massive water tanks over the Main and Orchard buildings have not been cleaned out for years, and that they are as likely to cause the spread of disease as any other source. Another thing which is being complained of, especially among the staff, is the way in which the food is prepared for the daily consumption of the patients. In the main building kitchen the conditions are stated to be far from satisfactory.. In preparing the food each day a certain number of the patients are employed in the kitchen, and it is claimed that the conditions under which they work leave room for great improvement.

KINDNESS TO MAKE GOOD CITIZENS OF FOREIGN WORKERS

Board of Education Considers Problem of Educating the Strangers

CHANGE CONDITIONS IN METHOD OF LIVING

Those Who Have Done Work Among Russians State Case to School Trustees.

The problem of the foreigner withn the city's gates was discussed at the meeting of No. 1 committee of the board of education Thursday afternoon, and it was decided to recommend to the board that some action be taken to educate them. A definite scheme will be worked out later. A deputation consisting of Mr. G. N. Weekes, E. R. Wilson, of the Y. M. C. A., Rev. W. R. McIntosh, Mrs. J. M. McEvoy, Miss McColl, and Miss Munro were present to request the board to take some action.

Mr. Weekes was the first to address the committee. He explained that the foreign population of the city was rowing rapidly. A few years ago there were few foreigners. Now the number was so large that a problem of serious import was to be faced and solved. During his investigations, he found that there were hundreds of foreigners, chiefly from Russia, liv ing in the eastern section of the city \$2,000 a Fortune to Them.

The majority of them were me who came to this country to make Their idea was to obtain, say \$2,000, and return to their own land, where they could live in fort the rest of their days. With no amilies, the men generally herded together. Conditions as a result were far from satisfactory, the houses being badly kept and insanitary. The men were of a good type, strong and dependable. They are ignorant, Few can understand Eng-Some cannot even read nor lish. write in their own language.

"We must reach them through English language," said Mr. Weekes. "I would suggest evening classes, say from 8 to 9 o'clock, two evenings a week. We could furnish them some sort of an entertainment, and give them a lesson in English. By this means we could attract them, and make their lives somewhat pleasant. When they had obtained a working knowledge of English we could teach them something about our laws and

How to Get to Their Hearts. "Refreshments might be served and in this way we could reach them by kindness. It would result in making good citizens of them here, and if they returned to Russia good results would follow even there. The men are anxious to go back home with their savings. It is true that they often return to Canada, but many remain in their native land."

Y. M. C. A. had done for the education of foreigners here. Classes had been organized, and at one time there was an enrollment of 55 men.
