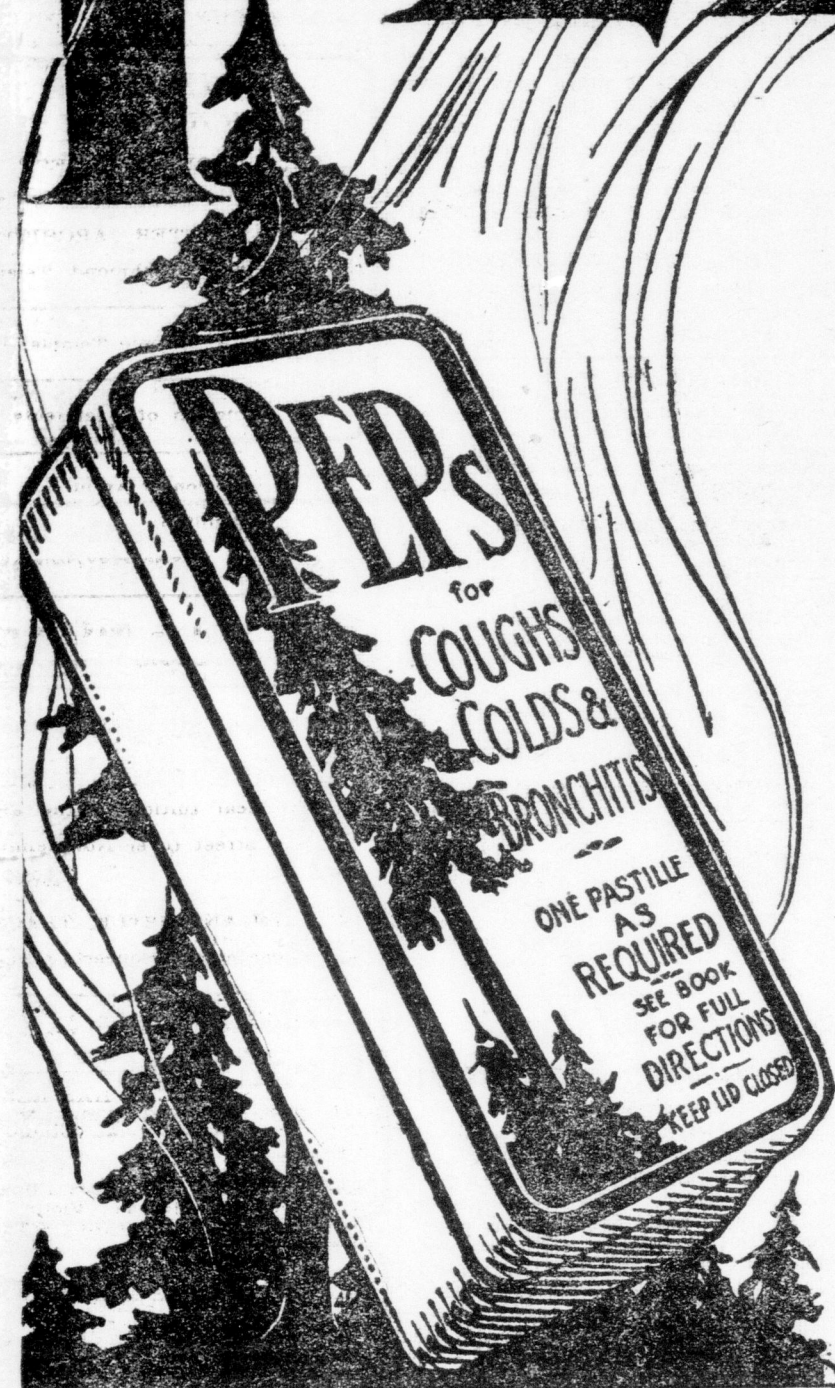

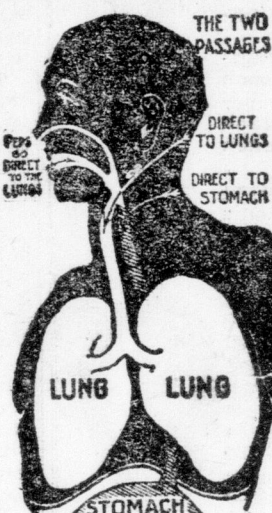

### MRS. STOCKTON FATALLY HURT

Harriston Woman Was Knocked Down by the Bicycle Her Grandson Rode.

FRACTURED HER SKULL

Harriston, Oct. 6.—Mrs. Louise Jane Stockton succumbed yesterday to injuries sustained a few days ago, when she was knocked down on the sidewalk by a bicycle on which her grandson was riding. She received a fracture of the skull, and never fully regained consciousness.

The deceased was in her 79th year. She formerly resided in the Township of Hawick, where she and her husband were among the earliest settlers. On the death of her husband some ten years ago she took up her residence in Harriston. Three of a family survive her, one son, Benjamin, at home, and two daughters, Mrs. E. Pritchard, with whom she resided, and Mrs. (Rev.) W. Pritchard, of Spokane, Wash., who arrived here today.

### PASSED BAD CHECK

Young Man Who Flim-Flamed Hospital Is Remanded to Jail.

Windsor, Oct. 6.—John Murray, of Belleville, who passed a worthless check on the Hotel Dieu here two weeks ago in payment of a hospital bill, receiving \$18 in change, was convicted in the police court today of obtaining money fraudulently. Murray said that he had written his sister to place the money in the bank to meet the check, but she had neglected to do so. Magistrate Leggett told him that he should have seen that the money was in the bank before he cashed the check. He was remanded for sentence.

### CRIMINAL OPERATION

Ottawa Woman Is Under Arrest on Very Serious Charge.

Ottawa, Oct. 6.—Mrs. Annie Balcomb, 148 Chapel street, was placed under arrest today on the charge of performing a criminal operation, which resulted in the death of Emily Cornick, aged 24. The girl died yesterday, and she is alleged to have gone to Mrs. Balcomb's house on Sept. 19, the operation having been performed a few days later. Mrs. Balcomb appeared in court here today and was remanded for a week without pleading. She was involved in a criminal operation charge against a Hull doctor two years ago, but was acquitted.

### AUSTRALIA IS URGING CONFERENCE ON NAVY

Defence of the Pacific Is a Big Question To Be Settled.

Sydney, Oct. 6.—The correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says the announcement that the Imperial Government had decided not to call a naval conference has caused astonishment mingled with some resentment, especially as it synchronizes with the celebration in honor of the arrival of the Australian warships. Mr. Milson, the minister of defence, said today that supposing the intelligence to be officially confirmed it would require considerable justification, and be received with deep regret. It is declared that the agreement of 1909 has not been carried out by the mother country, and that Australia ought to know what are the intentions of the Imperial Government, what it thinks of the needs of defence in the Pacific generally, and what it will do to get those needs. An inter-Dominion conference is suggested if the Imperial Government persists in its refusal to call a conference, but it is hoped that the necessity for this may not arise on account of the harm it might do to the cause of imperial unity. The political instability at present existing here is not regarded as a justification for the home Government's attitude in opposing a conference which was approved and strongly urged by the Fisher Government. The hope is expressed on all sides that the Imperial Government will reconsider its decision.

### Missionaries Are Still Unharmed

Pekin, Oct. 6.—A message dated Oct. 3 was received today at Slang Yang-Pu, in Hu-Peh Province, from the Rev. Christian Stokstad and the Rev. Mr. Johnson, the two American missionaries trying to negotiate with the Chinese bandits for the release of the American and Norwegian missionaries held in captivity by the bandits at Tsao-yang. It says that three white women and two children are at the bandits' headquarters and have not been harmed, while the men are believed to be living. This message appears to discredit the report that the little son of the Rev. Mr. Fauske and Mrs. Fauske has been killed. The Rev. C. Stokstad and the Rev. Mr. Johnson express the hope that the force of 1,800 troops round Tsao-yang will be able to hold the bandits until reinforcements arrive. The bandits number about 1,000, of whom half are mounted.

### WORKMAN WAS DROWNED.

Montreal, Oct. 6.—While working on the floating dock which yesterday raised the damaged liner Mount Temple, for repairs, Simon Ouellette, fell into the water and was drowned. He was unable to see the life line that was thrown to him, owing to the fog.

### Exeter Merchant Stricken at Clinton

Clinton, Oct. 6.—D. A. Ross, of the firm of Ross & Taylor, Exeter, died suddenly here today at the home of Mrs. Arthur Crouch. Mr. Ross came to Clinton on Saturday with his wife to make a short visit, and yesterday attended church services morning and evening and also motored to Seaford in the afternoon, and retired at eleven o'clock feeling quite well. His heart has been weak for some years, and at times caused his family a good deal of anxiety, and another sudden attack caused his death this morning. Mr. Ross was in his 60th year, was a prominent manufacturer in Exeter, and an active member of the Methodist Church. He leaves his wife and three sons, Dr. Prescott Ross, Warren and Will Ross.

### Had an Extra Bar During Fall Fair

Berlin Man's Case Will Be Made a Test By Authorities.

Berlin, Ont., Oct. 7.—The question of whether a hotel can legally have two separate bars is to be settled by Magistrate Weir. To test the liquor act on this point High Constable Huber has laid an information against Albert Genz, hotelman, of Elmira; Peter Wagner and George Rummig, proprietors of hotels in Wellesley. It is alleged that during the fall fair days they conducted extra bars to handle the increased trade, and it is maintained this is an infraction of the liquor act. The case was adjourned until Saturday.

### Richard Strong Is Dead at Galt

Galt, Oct. 6.—At his home, Purbeck House, Richard Sidney Spark Strong died at noon today in his 89th year. A resident of Galt for 65 years, he was closely associated with the growth of the town, being on the directorate of the Gore District Mutual Fire Insurance Company for half a century and manager of the company for over 30 years. Previous to this he was in business as a druggist in Dundas and Galt, and for a time farmed near Goderich. He was born at Purbeck, Dorset, England, migrating to Canada when 16 years of age. His wife died 17 years ago, but there still survive one son, A. D. of Galt, and two daughters, Mrs. Hugh B. Lewis, of Ottawa, and Mrs. Wilson A. McWhinney, of Detroit, Mich. The funeral has been arranged for Wednesday afternoon.

### PASTOR RESIGNED.

Walkerton, Oct. 6.—Rev. Mr. Park, for three years pastor of the Baptist Church here, resigned after the regular morning service Sunday. His resignation was accepted. Mr. Park has been one of the most successful ministers and workers that Walkerton has ever had.

### Looking for Owner of Baby in Basket

Hamilton, Oct. 6.—Despite efforts of the police to keep the affair secret, the discovery has just been made that a week ago last Monday night a baby boy, six weeks old, was left in a basket on the doorstep of E. D. and Mrs. Marawa, 166 Market street. The child was warmly dressed in new clothing, and the basket contained a package of infant's food, bottle, powder and puff.

A postcard inside stated that the parents were respectable, but dead, and concluded with the statement that more would be heard about the case in a week.

The basket was purchased from A. Norman, a local grocer, who describes the purchaser as a young man, 25 years old, middle height and clean-shaven. He would know him again, he says. The child is now in an institution.

### THAW LOSES POINT

His Treaty Rights as a Citizen Were Not Infringed Upon.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 6.—None of Harry K. Thaw's treaty rights as an American citizen were violated when Canadian immigration authorities forcibly deported him a few weeks ago. That was the ruling today of Solicitor Joseph W. Folk, of the state department. Thaw asked the state department to make representations to the British embassy in protest against his deportation on Sept. 1. In holding that none of his rights had been violated, the department declined to do so.

### BRUSSELS FAIR

Fine List of Entries, Great Weather and Big Crowd.

Friday evening it was estimated 1,200 people were present. The total receipts from the concerts were over \$300.
