PARIS, Jan. 7 .- 6:20 p.m .- The cabinet has approved a measure, for submission to Parliament, making permanent the prohibi-tion of the sale of the absinthe and other similar liquors. The Government finds that the military decree forbidding absinthe affects the population beneficial-

The cabinet has also approved a bill which provides that no licenses shall be issued to new establishments for the sale of spirituous liquors, unless accessory to a restaurant.
