Prisoners and Booty Taken. "The number of prisoners taken in the battle of the 16th continues to increase, at present numbering 2,817 men and 75 officers. The booty already listed onsists of 3 guns, 49 machine guns, 36 bomb-throwers, 8 cases of grenades and bombs, 60 cases of ammunition, 58 cases of machine gun cartridge belts, and 3 depots containing 35,570 shells 5,230 hand grenades and a huge quantity of rifle cartridges and other material.

Victory On Styr. Russian troops, advancing towards he northern Galician border, have defeated the Austro-Hungarians in the region of the confluence of the Styr and Lipa Rivers, and have captured more than 1,600 prisoners, says an earlier statement. The Austrians retired to the heights near the town of Berestechk. The official statement follows: "On many sectors of the Dvina front there were violent artillery fights.

Enemy Bewildered.

"In the region of the Styr, above its onfluence with the Lipa, we dealt another stroke at the enemy, ejecting him from the village of Verbene and from fortified works south of that vilage, and, keeping on the heels of his story, will not altogether agree with bewildered rear, seized the crossings of the Styr. 
