Cracking Silo Saves Farmers

INDIANS RETURNING TO OLD CUSTOMS

Claim Movement Started To Bring Tribes Back To Ancient Rites.

Canadian Press Despatch. Montreal, Oct. 17.—That the In-dians were returning to their ancient rites and customs, and were "throw-ing off their artificialities which the white men have constantly endeav-ored to impose upon us," was stated here in an interview today by Chief Dominic Two Axe, of the Indian tribes in Montreal district.

"The nationalist tendencies among my people are becoming more and more manifest," he said. His own last baby was not baptized by a white man's ceremony, but was initiated by Two Axe into the Iroquois reli-gion. More unbaptized babies would be taken into the Iroquois faith during the next seasonal prayer-dance ceremonies, which will be held from January 5 to January 11.

The Indians of the Caughnawaga reserve, near here, the chief explained, had gone back to the old customs of observing, four times a year—in spring, summer, autumn and mid-winter—ceremonies, during which prayer was offered to the "Great Spirit," accompanied by tribal dan-cing.

The Indians' traditions had been handed down from mother to babe even to the present day, said Two Axe, and a big movement was on foot over America to bring all the tribes back to the old cults and cere-monies. He explained that the Iro-quois of America had selected Ton-awanda, N.Y., as their capital, and that their first parliament assembled there about a week ago. The first aim of this council was to press the Iroquois claims against the United States government for moneys they assert amount to several millions of dollars.

PLOWING MATCH ATTRACTS 30,000

Brampton Scene of Interna-tional Competition—Many Indians Enter.

Canadian Press Despatch. Brampton, Oct. 17.—Thirty thous-and people attended the international plowing match at Brampton today. This was the most conservative esti-mate made by Managing Director J. Lockie Wilson. Visitors were lined up ten deep along the headlands when the men and horses were finishing their work, while interest in the tractor competition, three-quarters of a mile away, was almost as keen.

Despite a threat of rain in the air for the past 48 hours, the weather was fine. The sod-plowing classes were run off today. There were 83 entries. With as high as 28 plowmen in some of the horse classes and 26 tractors in the competition for mechanical power interest was increased by the presence of nineteen Indian plowmen, who proved that this old art cannot be mastered alone by white men. The Indians were there from all the principal reserves, including a con-tingent led by Father Cabot from Cape Croker. These men have all been champions in local plowing matches and as a reward for their efforts in these events given a free trip to the provincial competition.

To show his personal interest, his honor took off his coat and did some plowing with an ox team brought from the west by W. J. Lowe, winning the applause of the spectators. PRINCE OF WALES ENJOYS GOLF GAME

Visits Ottawa Club, Later En-tertained To House Ball.

Ottawa, Oct. 17.—The Prince of Wales played 18 holes of golf this afternoon at the Royal Ottawa golf club, and danced tonight at the Gov-ernment House ball, which was at-tended by 450 of the younger set of Ottawa. The prince, accompanied by the governor-general, arrived at the golf club shortly after 2 o'clock.

The dance at Rideau Hall was per-haps the most brilliant ever held in the history of the famous residence of Canada's governor-generals. His royal highness, who received the guests just inside the ballroom with their excellencies the governor-gen-eral and Lady Byng, was quick to identify many former friends among the younger set of the capital. It was entirely a young people's party, and limited to the city, for none of the hundreds of invitations issued were sent to outside addresses. More than 20 dances and encores were given during the evening, and the prince enjoyed most of them. At 11 o'clock his royal highness led the way with Her Excellency Lady Byng to the racquet court, which had been transformed into a perfectly-appointed dining-room.

RUSSIAN TRANSPORT IS BRINGING BACK VICTIMS

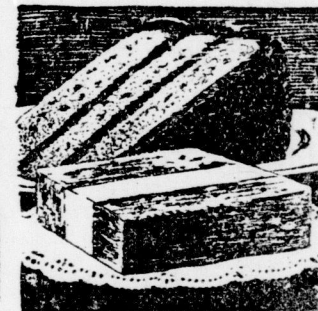
