M'CAUL-STREET ELECTRIC CARS.

The City Declines to Permit of the Transfer of the Service to

The Board of Works met yesterday morning to consider the following report from Engineer Keating:

"I beg to call your attention to the provisions of the 24th section of the conditions of sale forming a part of the agreement with the Toronto Railway Company, and to ask whether I shall require company to make the changes for which this section provides in the McCall-street line."

In the event of the council approving of this change being made, that is, of changing the street railway service to the overhead trolley wire electric system, I shall at once require the company to make the change forthwith in McCall-street, from Queen-street to College-street.

"In the same event I further recommend that the council ratify my recommendation contained in the executive report upon the report for the year 1933, for the paving of the track allowance in McCall-street with vitrified brick on concrete, as an estimated cost of \$17,250."

Chairman Lamb explained that it was necessary for the council to decide upon the conversion of the street railway system in McCall-street and recommended adoption of the engineer's report.

Ald. Thompson objected, claiming that a service in University-street would be more beneficial.

Mr. Meredith advised the committee that if double tracks were put down in McCall-street it would be necessary to widen the roadway. This would be done by reducing the width of the boulevards and removing the trees. The Municipal Act provides for the compensation to owners for planting and caring for trees.

The report was adopted. The class of pavement to be laid changed from vitrified brick to asphalt.

The Executive Committee then met and passed and sent to the council a report on the subject. Ald. Stewart was appointed chairman during the absence of Ald. Shaw. The report of the council convention will be published in the Toronto World.

The council adopted the report of the executive. By-laws to legalize the report were read and passed.

Ald. Stewart made an unsuccessful attempt to induce the council to instruct the City Engineer to burn down the old small-pox hospital.

Many Wills Probed. Messrs. E. B. Oler and James Henderson, barrister, are the executors of the will of Andrew Thornton Todd, who died last December, and they have filed the will for probate. 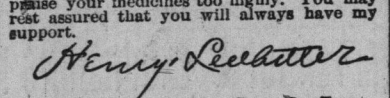
