NOT IN CARDWELL RACE.

THIS MUCH IS KNOWN OF HOM CLARKE WALLACE'S INTENTIONS.

e Ex-Controller Had Expressed His Willingness to Make the Race For Mr. White's Late Seat, But the Circumstances Were Not Propitious—What Mr. Wallace Has to Say on the Subject.

"I am in favor of national schools and the National Policy. There is not candidate in Cardwell to-day who is on the same lines. One is a Liberal and of course opposed to the Nations al Policy; another is in favor of nas tional schools and free trade; another er is in favor of the National Policy and also of the forcing of separate schools upon Manitoha T should have liked to have seen a candidate agreedate I would have supported. I may say that I made a proposal with a view to the presentation of such a candidate. I offered myself, if one of the candidates would stand aside, resign my seat in West York and run in the county on the lines I have indicated, thus making it a straight fight, and, I hould add, risking my political fuples. I could not, however, accomplish that, and, as a result, I have not in the meantime standing ground in the contest," so said Hon. Clarke Wallace over the telephone from his Woods bridge home late last night.

There is a great deal of sympathy expressed for Clarke Wallace these days by his old friends, and they are

They seem to think that he has made a mis-move. They also think that there must have been a terrible mistake somewhere, especially in regard to the late Controller and Mr. E. F. Clarke. Mr. Clarke and Mr. Wallace have been rivals for years, and

They were rivals in a race for supremacy in the Orange order and rivals for the political leadership of that order in connection with the Conservative

Mr. Clarke, who is editor and pro-prietor of The Orange Sentinel, has been very outspoken on two points 2 (1) That Manitoba must not be coerced on the school question; (2) that the pre-sent tariff must be modified—it was

too burdensome.

In regard to the first of these two
Mr. Clarke was in line with that other Protestant champion, D'Alton Mc-Carthy, and also in line with Clarke Wallace. On the second question he also agreed with D'Alton McCarthy, but disagreed with the late Controller. It was given out on the day of Mr. Wallace's resignation that Mr. Clarke and he had come to an agreement, had forgiven the old-time rivalry and that
