The Late Dr. D. B. Cornell, of Saginaw, Mich.

The death at 2.30 o'clock, Saturday morning of Dr. Daniel B. Cornell, at his home, 315 South Warren avenue, came as a shock to his very many friends in the city, there having been a rather general impression he was in no immediate danger. He suffered recently from an ulcerated tooth, infection developed, followed by blood poisoning, and despite every effort to counteract the effects of this trouble death resulted.

Daniel B. Cornell was a native of Arkansas, Ontario, being born there in 1854, and receiving his early education in the public and high schools of the district. He then entered and graduated from the University of Toronto, and engaged in educational pursuits, being science master at the Mitchell, Ont., high school for a few years. He turned his attention to the study of medicine, and graduated from the Detroit college, as well as from the New York post-graduate medical school and hospital.

Dr. Cornell came to Saginaw in 1889. Engaging in the practice of his profession, he specialized in eye, ear, nose and throat troubles, with success and distinction, being ranked as one of the foremost practitioners in Michigan. He gave lectures in the line of his specialization for the Michigan college of medicine and surgery of Detroit. He is survived by his widow and one daughter, Mrs. E. F. Wilson, of this city.

The funeral took place Monday afternoon, six members of the medical profession being the pallbearers.

Cornell, South St. Marie; Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Cornell, Reed City, Mich.; Mr. T. G. Mitchell, Watford, Ont.; W. J. Mitchell, Parkhill, Ont.; George Brock, Strathroy, Ont.; Mr. and Mrs. George Stoner, Arkansas, Ont.

Dr. Cornell was widely known and enjoyed a high professional reputation. He was one of the leading medical specialists of the state. He possessed a large intellect, a strong personality and was unusually well-informed. He was always a conscientious practitioner, with an ethical appreciation of his responsibilities. In public affairs Dr. Cornell was a citizen of great worth. His influence was invariably to be found on the broad side of right.

Register Money Letters or Use Orders

Ottawa, March 31.—Thousands of letters are lying in the dead letter offices in Ottawa, Toronto and other cities, that contain money. That is the reason why they are in the dead office. It is contrary to a regulation recently put in force to send money through the mail, unless by postal order, cheque, or in a registered envelope. The order was issued to stop the sending of money through the mails, and the idea was to remove temptation as far as possible from postal employees.

Many retail houses do a good deal of rural business in this way. Many of their customers enclose coins in envelopes and send through the post to retail houses. There is no penalty attached to the sending of money through the mails, but the sending of it is contrary to the regulations, and unregistered letters which are being found to contain money have been sent to the dead letter offices.

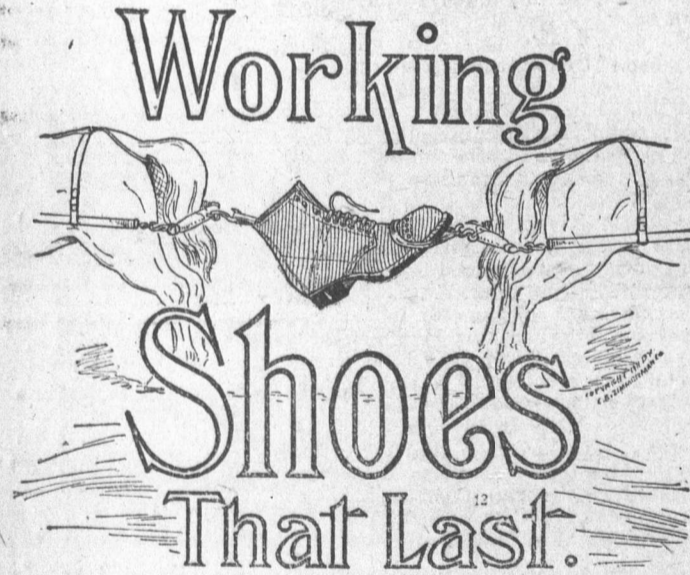
