## PRELATE APPEALS THE CASE

### Church Officials Declare Wine Was Purchased for Sacramental Purposes

Milwaukee, Wis., Dec. 22—Protests have been made to Washington against the seizure of communion wine shipped from California to Rt. Rev. Dr. Hunting, bishop of the Episcopal diocese of Nevada, by a prohibition inspector.

The Living Church, of this city, organ of the high church party in the United States, says: "We have yet to hear of a more high-handed outrage than the seizure by a prohibition inspector of two cases of wine for sacramental purposes that had been shipped to Bishop Hunting at Reno, Nevada, for the use of the clergy of his district in the administration of Holy Communion; unless, indeed, it be the explanation of his proceeding attributed to that functionary, which is worse than the act itself. According to published reports, this gentleman holds that as no druggist in Nevada has apparently been granted, under the provisions of the state prohibition law, the right to sell wine for sacramental purposes, therefore no wine for sacramental purpose can be brought into the state of Nevada. What is a little thing like the constitutional guarantee of the right of freedom of religion compared with so profound a conception of law as that?"

Bishop Hunting said of the seizure:

"I am waiting on William Woodburn, United States attorney, to whom I have made a complete statement of the facts in the case. The wine was purchased in California in strict accordance with the provisions of the federal law and was shipped to Nevada at my direction, in absolute good faith and strictly for sacramental purposes."

Mr. Woodburn, in turn, is said to agree with the bishop and to hold that the seizure was illegal. He says:

"I feel that a liberal construction should be given to the law. Bishop Hunting purchased this wine in California for sacramental purposes. I am convinced his action was in absolute good faith and he complied in every detail with the requirements of the federal law in making the purchase. The shipment was made after Bishop Hunting had consulted with Father Murphy (Roman Catholic) of Virginia City and ascertained what procedure he had followed in getting a shipment of wine for sacramental purposes."

"Father Murphy's shipment of wine was delivered without question and Bishop Hunting followed exactly the same procedure. I feel that under the circumstances the wine should be released. I have taken the matter up by wire with the head of the prohibition enforcement authorities at Washington."

The Living Church says that the "removal of this inspector is the only satisfactory solution of the mess that he has made; not because he has failed, probably, to act in good faith, but because he has demonstrated the lack of sufficient brain power to enable him to wield authority creditably on behalf of the United States."

## Marine News

M. A. Belliveau (sch) Pamps for Havana; sld Dec 15.

Schr. Nettie C. Capt Arthur Doucette, sailed from Norfolk Dec 7th, for Lamentin.

Schr. E. P. Theriault, Cape Docete Doucette, arrived at Mobile, Nov 30, from Yarmouth.

Schr. Charlotte Comeau, Capt John Stewart arrived at Buenos Ayres Nov 30 from St. John, N. B.

Schr. C. Maude Gaskill, Capt Granville, which arrived at New York from Hillsboro, N. B., will load hard coal at that port for Yarmouth.

Schr. St. Clair Theriault, Capt H. P. LeBlanc, arrived at Jacksonville Dec 6 from Tila de Cora. The above schooner has been chartered to load hard pine at that port for Demerara.

The tern schr Barbara W. 286 tons, of Parrsboro, has sailed from Bear River for Cuba with a cargo of lumber, after discharging at Cuba, the vessel will engage in Gult trade during the winter.

The tern schr Maid of Canada, Capt John Willie, was still at Barbadoes on the 10th awaiting a charter. The schooner took a cargo of shingles from Bay Cheleur, via La. Have to Barbadoes.

The tern schr Leo LeBlanc, Capt John Richard, recently in port at New York from Digby, will proceed to Norfolk and load coal for Martinique.

Capt Leander Bothier, of Grosses Coques, will take command of the schooner, relieving Capt Richard who will return to his home at Wedgeport.

The Ononette, a three masted schooner of 433 tons register, which brought a cargo of hard coal to Halifax last month, was reported recently at Liverpool loaded with pulp for New York, the cargo being sent by the McLeod Pulp & Paper Co., Ltd. Capt Longmire, commands the Ononette.

LIQUOR POURS INTO HALIFAX

(Thursday's Halifax Herald)

With the approach of the Christmas season the shipments of whisky and other varieties of spirituous and fermented liquors into Halifax has reached the proportions of a flood. Every express train from Montreal has some on board not to mention the shipments which come by freight, and nearly every boat from Great Britain or the West Indies brings large consignments.

Most of these wet goods are being imported so the consignees and their friends may be able to imbibe after the bone dry law, for which the people voted October 25, comes into effect, probably next month. A considerable quantity of it, however, is for Christmas consumption, and this is the reason for the sudden large increase in the importations.

Customs and shipping men declare that from present indications enough liquor will come into Halifax during Christmas week alone to give everybody in town at least one glass, if it were distributed in a socialist manner.

They also expect that after Christmas the flood will roll on and on until the new law cuts off all sources of lawful supply.

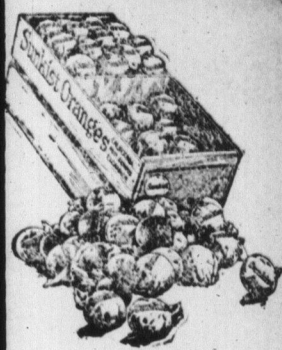
