 The town of Alameda, Sask., was almost completely wiped out by fire on Dec. 5. The loss was \$200,000 with \$125,000 insurance.

**Schr. Champion Lost.**  
 The schooner Champion, Capt. Burdock, from Port Aux Basque for Halifax with a cargo of fish, went ashore at Deadman's Cove, and was a total loss. One man, named Holman, was drowned.

**550 Miners Entombed.**  
 By an explosion in two nearby mines in Monongah, W. Va. 550 miners were entombed on Dec. 6. Several bodies were recovered and it is feared that many of the men are dead. Later reports up to Dec. 7th said 53 bodies had been recovered.
