I wished Miss Morgan might have been able to see this result of her abors. Our little maid, O Maki, will soon follow, and I hope it won't be long before our other Japanese teacher omes out strongly as a disciple of Christ.

Then there was that nice visit with the friends in Azabu, when we had such merry, happy times, and threw off for a while the weight of responsibility which we cannot help eeling when in the midst of our work. Then the homeoming and settling down again to the daily round of our That is just what it is for us, as well as for those at "The daily round and common task"-we never ome. et beyond that, if we take life right, no matter what sphere ve may be in. Some people think because we leave home and riends behind, and come so far away, there is an interest nd romance about our lives which makes them exciting: ut you know differently, I am glad to say, and can apprehate the difficult is we have to meet and the patience with hich we must wait for the fruit of our labors. I am a ttle surprised sometimes at the ideas contained in some tters I have received, where people have an idea that all e have to do is to out and gather the people in by scores. hey do not realize how long it takes to get their confidence ven after they begin to trust us.

I am happy to say every girl but one, and she came to hidznoka but was taken sick at her guardian's, will be here ext week, I expect, returned after the holidays. As the hange in principalship usually brings a change in the attenance, I thought there might be a little falling off. As here was none, it is a good sign that their interest in obtain-
