KNOX'S COLLEGE—BURSARIES FOR  
SESSION 1855-6.

BURSARIES will be awarded at the opening  
of the next Session of Knox's College, accord-  
ing to the following Scheme:—

- 1.—For the best examination in the Grammar of  
the English Language, open to all entrants,  
£2 10s.
- 2.—For the best examination in the Grammar of  
the Latin Language, open to all entrants,  
£2 10s.
- 3.—For the best examination in the Grammar of  
the Greek Language, open to all entrants,  
£2 10s.
- 4.—The George Buchannan Bursary of £10,  
(founded by Isaac Buchannan, Esq.) for emi-  
nence in Latin and Greek, as proved by ex-  
amination in the Grammar of both Languages;  
Livy, Book 1, 30 chaps; Horace, 3rd Book of

Odes; Xenophon's Memorabilia. Collect.  
Maj. Book 1st, chaps. 2, 3, 4; Herodotus—  
Pisistratus and Cyrus, in Collect. Major. II-  
iad, Book 3, 200 lines; Roman Antiquities,  
and an Exercise in Arnold's Latin composi-  
tion.

5.—For the best Examination in Hebrew Gram-  
mar, the first thirty Psalms, and first ten chap-  
ters of Genesis, £5. Open to Students who  
have been two Sessions at Hebrew.

The Gaelic Bursaries of the Colonial Committee  
of the Free Church of Scotland.

6.—For the best examination on the Grammar  
of the Gaelic Language, with Readings and  
Shorter Catechism, £4.

7.—For the best written exposition, in Gaelic, of  
the Lords Prayer, £6.

8.—Open to Students who attended the Junior  
Philosophy Class during the Session 1855-6.  
A Bursary of £7 10s. for the best examination  
on the first 51 Lectures of Dr. Thomas Brown,  
and the first two books of Locke's Essay on  
the Human Understanding.

9.—Open to Students who attended the Senior  
Philosophy Class during the Session 1855-6.  
A Bursary of £7 10s. for the best examina-  
tion on Lock's Essay on the Human Under-  
standing, Edwards on the Will, and Macin-  
tosh's Dissertation on Ethical Philosophy (or  
some other work giving a full account of the  
leading systems of Morals.)

10.—Open to Students who attended the Junior  
Theology Class during the Session 1855-6.  
A Bursary of £7 10s. for the best examina-  
tion on Butler's Analogy (parts I. & II),  
Hodge's Commentary on the Romans, and Dr.  
Lindsay Alexander's "Christ and Christi-  
anity."

11.—Divinity—John Knox's Bursary (£10) for  
the best Essay on the Sinai covenant; its  
nature, and its relation to the covenant of  
grace.

12.—Biblical Criticism and Hermeneutics.—For  
the best critical Essay on Isaiah 33rd chap.,  
verses 8, 9, and 10, comparing various read-  
ings and versions.

13.—Christian History.—For the best account of  
the Reformed Church of France, and the prin-  
cipal instances of its contentings and sufferings.

14.—A Special Bursary of £10, open for com-  
petition to all Entrants, will be given by the  
Gaelic congregation, for the best examination  
on the first six Books of Virgil's Aeneid, and  
the first six Books of Homer's Iliad, or as  
large a portion of both as competitors may  
prefer. In the adjudication of the Bursary,  
respect will be had, on the one hand to cor-  
rectness of translation and grammatical know-  
ledge, and on the other to the quantity read.

REMARKS.

1. The Essays to be given into the Secretary  
of the Professors' Court, on or before the first day  
of October.

2. The days of Examination to be specified at  
the opening of the College.

3. The Essays must be correctly and legibly  
written, with mottos on the title pages, instead  
of the names of the authors.

4. Brevity, when consistent with completeness  
in the particular treatise, perspicuity of style and  
appropriateness of illustration, will be esteemed  
an additional excellence. No Essay to occupy  
more than forty minutes in reading.

5. A student who may have obtained Bursar-  
ies Nos. 4, or 11, in any former Session, cannot  
obtain the corresponding Bursary a second time;  
though he may compete for it, and if deserving of  
it, his merit will be noticed.

6. Should the same student be successful in  
competing for more than one Bursary, his name  
will be mentioned first in the public statements,  
but not more than one Bursary will be assigned  
to him.
