The way in which the three-fourths belonging to the Thornhill association have been appropriated has been minutely detailed in the Reports of your committee for former years. It will from these sources; leaving, exclusive of Mr. therefore suffice on the present occasion to observe generally that for three consecutive years this branch appropriated £20 per annum towards sum of £60, new stands to the credit of this association in the books of the Parent Society, and is still available for the purpese originally intended, the Lord Bishop not having been able as yet to spare the services of a Clergyman for that important sphere of duty. And here your committee beg to acknowledge with much thankfulness the munificent donation of £100 currency given a year or two since by a member of the Society resident in this Parish as a contribution to this object, which if not the most is certainly one of the most important objects which the Society has in 'iew, viz." the Mission Fund. ' For two years successively grants to the amount of £10 each year, were made in aid of the erection of the Church at the Oak Ridges; and for other two years the three-fourths were laid out upon improvements in the burial ground and Church at Thornhill. This brings the account of the expenditure to the close of the year 1851; since which period it has been re-olved that the three-fourths belonging to this branch shall be mention the liberal donation of a debenture applied to raising a fund for the erection of a Parsonage house in this Parish, and they have consequently been so applied for the years 1852 and 1853, and accounts brought into the Vestry books, of which the following is an abstract.
