Rome, Oct. 23 -The Conference at the Vatican on the proposed union of the Eastern Church with the Holy Sco will open to morrow. Cardinals Rampolla, Ledochowski, Vannutelli, Galinaberti and Langenieux, and the Patriarchs Jusuff and Renni will be presented. The Maronites also will represented. It is uncertain whether or not the Pope will be able to attend the first sitting.




