FEVER OF TUBERCULOSIS IN CHILDREN.—Dr. Rachford (*Covremennaya Klinika*), in treatment of the fever of tuberculosis, and particularly that of the lungs, in children, advises the following salves:

Rub a little of the salve of the size of a hazelnut into the region of the chest each evening. — Med. and Surg. Reporter.

FLATULENCE, -- For flatulence in children Ringer recommends:

R Tinct. asafeetidæf	l 5ss.
Aq. destill	1 <u>5</u> ij.

M. Sig.: A teaspoonful every hour or two.

For flatulence due to fermentation:

R	Acidi sulphfl	5jss.
	Syr. zingiberis	5vjss.
	Aq. destill fl	5i.

M. Sig.: A teaspoonful.—Ex.

R	Eucalyptol	žss.

Red oxide of mercury gr. x
Vaseline 5 ss
Sig. Apply to the edge of lid at bedtime.

Ammoniated mercury gr. xx
Powdered camphor gr. x
Vaseline f Ess



Ointment of rose-water 3 iij

Sig. Apply at night.
