## News of the Week.

THE DOMINION.—The following is the personnel of Mr. Mackenzie's cabinet:—Mackenzie, Public Works; Dorion, Justice; Blake, member of the Privy Council, without department; A. J. Smith, Marine and Fisheries; Letellier de St. Just, Agriculture; Cartwright, Finance; Laird, Secretary of State for Interior; Christie, Secretary of State; Burpee, Gustoms; D. A. Macdonald, Postmaster-General; Coffin, Receiver General; Fournier, Inland Revenue; W. Ross, Militia and Defence; and R. W. Scott, member of the Privy Council without a portfolio.— Mr. Crawford, of Toronto, was sworn in Lieut. Governor of Ontario on Monday.—Lépine has been committed for trial.

FRANCE.—President MacMatton has refused to accept the resig-FRANCE.—President MacMation has refused to accept the resignation of the Ministry.—The Assembly met on Wednesday week.—The Parls Gazette des Tribunaux reports that a secret society at Autun had formed a plot to seize the niece of President MacMahon, and hold her as a hostage. The Gazette adds that several arrests have been made of parties implicated in the conspiracy.—In consequence of the position taken by the Comte de Chambord in his recent letter, the French Monarchists have abandoned all hope of restoring the Monarchy. The Conserva-tive Deputies in the Assembly will probably vote for an extension of MacMahon's term of office.

GERMANY .- It is probable that the Reichstag will soon be dissolved, and the elections for a new one are ordered to be held in the last week of December.—King John of Saxony is dead.— In the elections which have just taken place for Deputies to the Prussian Diet, the Liberals gain 20 seats.

AUSTRIA.—The Empress of Austria is ill, and her condition is such as to cause alarm.—The recent difficulty between Turkey and Austria has been amicably settled.—The sessions of the Reichstrath were opened on the 5th by the Emperor Francis Joseph in person. The Emperor's speech was pacific in its reference to foreign powers. It contains no other mutter of general interest.

SPAIN.—Senor Rios Rosas, a well known Spanish politician, is dead.——A Madrid despatch reports that the Spanish Government has advices from Manilla of the capture by a Spanish war steamer in those waters of two German merchantmen, having 2,000 rifles intended to be sold to the Malay pirates. The news has created an excited feeling in government circles at Madrid. The Carlists have inflicted a heavy defeat on the Republican troops near Miranda de Arga, in Navarre.
