Check If You Have Dual Nationality

To avoid unpleasant surprises, find out whether you, your spouse, or any other family member are citizens of another country. If you are considered a "national," you may be compelled to do military service or pay special taxes. Your child custody arrangements in Canada may not be recognized. In extreme cases, you or your child may not be allowed to leave. Check your status with the country's embassy or consular mission in Canada before you travel. If you do run into problems because of your dual nationality, contact the nearest Canadian mission immediately.

Access for People with Special Needs

Many countries do not provide access for people in wheelchairs or make allowances for those with special hearing, sight or other physical requirements. Contact your local access organization or talk to others who have travelled to your destination in the past. There are also several guides published about international travel and people with special needs. Check your local public library or bookstore.

Get Medical Advice before You Go Away

Your family physician or a travel medical clinic are good sources of medical advice. If you are being treated for an illness or are taking medication, ask your doctor before you leave if there are any special precautions you should take during your trip.
