Mr. Reid, Parliamentary Secretary to the President of the Privy Council, presented,—Returns to the foregoing Orders.

Mr. Sharp, seconded by Mr. Drury, moved,—That a Special Joint Committee of the Senate and of the House of Commons be appointed to consider the Green Paper on immigration policy tabled by the Minister of Manpower and Immigration in the House of Commons on February 3, 1975; and to invite the views of the public on the issues raised therein;

That 15 Members of the House of Commons to be designated at a later date be members on the part of this House on the Special Joint Committee;

That the Committee have power to appoint from among its Members such sub-committees as may be deemed advisable and necessary and to delegate to such subcommittees all or any of their powers except the power to report directly to the House;

That the Committee have power to sit during sittings and adjournments of the House of Commons;

That the Committee have power to send for persons, papers and records, and to examine witnesses and to print such papers and evidence from day to day as may be ordered by the Committee;

That the Committee have power to adjourn from place to place within Canada;

That the Committee be empowered to retain the services of advisers to assist in its work; and that it also be empowered to retain the professional, clerical and stenographic help as may be required;

That the Committee submit their report not later than July 31, 1975;

That the quorum of the Committee be 12 members, whenever a vote, resolution or other decision is taken, so long as both Houses are represented and that the Joint Chairmen be authorized to hold meetings, to receive evidence and authorize the printing thereof, when 6 members are present so long as both Houses are represented; and

That a Message be sent to the Senate requesting that House to unite with this House for the above purpose, and to select, if the Senate deems it to be advisable, Members to act on the proposed Special Joint Committee.

After debate thereon, the question being put on the motion, it was agreed to.

Bill C-10, An Act to amend the Prairie Grain Advance Payments Act, as reported (without amendment) from the Standing Committee on Agriculture, was concurred in at the report stage and, by unanimous consent, ordered for a third reading later this day.

Bill C-43, An Act to amend the Law Reform Commission Act, as reported (without amendment) from the Standing Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs, was concurred in at the report stage and, by unanimous consent, ordered for a third reading later this day.

Bill S-6, An Act to amend the Canadian Wheat Board Act, as reported (without amendment) from the Standing Committee on Agriculture, was concurred in at the report stage and, by unanimous consent, ordered for a third reading later this day.
