Mr. Chevrier: What is the date of the report?

The Deputy Chairman: Shall vote 276 carry?

Mr. Chevrier: No.

Progress reported.

Resolutions adopted in committee of supply this day reported and concurred in.

BUSINESS OF THE HOUSE

Mr. Chevrier: May I ask the house leader what the business is for tomorrow?

Mr. Green: Tomorrow we shall continue with the estimates of the Department of Northern Affairs and National Resources; then take the estimates of the Department of Labour and the Department of Transport.
