review plan, which is a pay group of the civil service. They would presumably receive any increase in salary at the time the group D cyclical review was decided upon and made applicable to the civil service at large.

Mr. Knowles: Mr. Speaker, can the minister say when that will be, and to what date any such increases will be retroactive?

Mr. McIlraith: It is very difficult at this stage to give a date when the determination will be made, but I would think that in the normal course it should be late this coming winter or early next spring. The group D pay changes are effective as of October 1, 1964; but I should add that some of the related groups in the House of Commons staff may have different effective pay adjustment dates. Therefore that pay date should not be taken as applicable to all the groups in the House of Commons; it should only be taken as the applicable date for the civil service.

Mr. H. W. Herridge (Kootenay West): A supplementary question, Mr. Speaker. Would the President of the Privy Council mind informing the house why on some occasions when he is asked questions about salary increases for the House of Commons staff he answers them, and on other occasions he indicates that it is not his responsibility to answer?

Mr. McIlraith: Yes, Mr. Speaker, I would be very glad to do that. I can do so by reading to the hon. member citation 184 of Beauchesne's fourth edition, which reads this way:

Standing order 39 does not allow questions addressed to the Speaker. If however members write to the Speaker and inquire about matters placed under his control, he is bound to give the information required.

Bearing in mind that rule, I have tried not to abuse it: but the hon, member for Winnipeg North Centre was able, in framing his question, to sufficiently relate it to the cyclical pay reviews of the civil service, which is a matter of my responsibility as a minister, to put his question in order, and I therefore answered his question.
