

CHAP. IV.

PARTICULAR ACCOUNT OF UPPER CANADA.

THE old province of Quebec was divided into two provinces, distinguished by the names of Upper and Lower Canada, by an Act of Parliament passed in the thirty-first year of his Majesty's reign. The line of division commences at a stone boundary on the north bank of lake St. Francis, at the cove west of *Point au Boul*, in the limit between the township of Lancaster, and the seigniorie of *New Longueil*; running in the direction of north thirty-four degrees west, to the westernmost angle of the said seigniorie of *New Longueil*: then along the north-western boundary of the seigniorie of *Vaudreuil*, running north twenty-five degrees east, until it strikes the Ottawas river. It ascends that river, into the lake Tomiscanning, and from the head of said lake proceeds by a line drawn due north, until it strikes the boundary line of Hudson's Bay; including all the territory to the westward
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
