

FRIDAY MORNING
SHORTHORN SALE AT
UNION YARDS BIG EVENT

Record Price of \$3600 is Paid For
Two-Year-Old Heifer—Sale
Averaged \$340 a Head.

If there was any lingering doubt in the minds of the livestock men of Canada as to the ability of the Shorthorns to retain their old time prestige, it must have been effectively removed by the magnificent results attained at the closing day of the fourth annual dispersion sale of the Scotch Shorthorns at the Union Stock Yards on Thursday, Feb. 10.

In the attendance of representative breeders and prospective buyers, and in the record prices obtained, the sale was a marvelous exposition of what the Dominion of Canada can accomplish. It was a great triumph for the devotees of the Scotch Shorthorn, and the United States buyers were present and the only regrettable feature of the sale was the fact that the fact that the prize of the province, "Bridal Bouquet," the wonderful yearling heifer, bred and owned by Miller Bros. of Brougham, was not sold.

A word as the record of this prize animal, "Bridal Bouquet," bred by Miller Bros. of Brougham, is a roan heifer, calving April 25, 1919, and is therefore now about 22 months old. She is a roan, and as a junior yearling, won the championship at the National Exhibition in September. Since then she has developed wonderfully, and is today admittedly superior to any other cow or heifer in America. In a marvelous degree she combines substance, beauty and grace.

To Miller Bros. of Brougham rightly belongs the greatest credit, for while rearing in a monetary sense is substantial reward, they have conferred upon Canada an infinitely greater benefit.

Little less sensational was the price obtained for "Woodfield Lovely," also owned by Miller Bros. and for which \$1225 was obtained. From \$500 the bids rose under the deft manipulation of Col. Jones of Chicago, Ill., the auctioneer to \$1000, eventually to \$1225, the price named.

Another animal consigned by Miller Bros. was "Chadwick," and for which \$1200 was secured with little difficulty. This was a roan heifer calving in August, 1919, and a wonderfully straight, smooth, and handsome animal.

"For Melba," a roan heifer bred by Hon. Geo. Drummond of Quebec, the sum of \$400 was paid by Tom Harding of Wisconsin, U. S.

"For Blink Bonny," a two-year-old roan heifer, bred by Hon. Geo. Drummond, \$750 was paid by Mr. Miller of New York State.

"Broadbrook's Beauty," bred by W. G. Pettit & Sons of Freeman, Ont., was sold to the Ames & Sons of Moffat, who paid \$245.

"Pine Grove Secret," bred by Hon. W. G. Edwards, Rockland, Ontario, brought \$150.

"Diamond Cross," owned by Hon. Geo. Drummond, went to John Miller of Brougham, for \$200, and was a bargain at the price. This animal was bred by William Anderson of Sappok, Old Meldrum, Aberdeenshire, Scotland, and not many finer animals have ever come across the briny.

Frank Harding of Wisconsin, U. S., for "Peace Lavender," paid \$675, one of Hon. Geo. Drummond's best.

"For Clonmel Lady," a beautiful roan heifer, the offering of H. A. Gardner of Highfield, the Elmsford Farm of Kentucky, U. S., paid \$225.

"Roseleaf," a white heifer calving in December, 1918, went to W. R. Elliott of Guilford, and brought \$505, with little or no trouble.

"Lavender," bred by Sir George Drummond, also went to the Elmsford Farm for \$180.

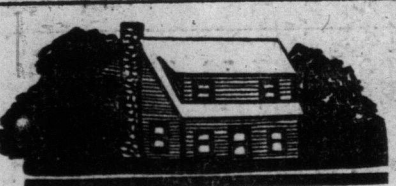
There was keen competition for "Burnbrae Sultan," bred by Robert Miller of Stratford. This fine animal, a white heifer calving in April, 1919, was bought by Prof. Day of the Ontario Agricultural College, and she is a tribute to Mr. Miller.

The "Canadian Duchess of Gloster" went to the Elmsford Farm, and she brought \$220 quick.

A good deal of interest centered in the sale of "Isobel," a magnificent roan cow, 10 years old, with calf at foot. This animal was bred by the late King Edward and imported by Sir George Drummond of Beaconsfield, Que. She was bought by William Keith of Lestow, Ont., for \$125.

Many other cows, heifers and bulls of great individual merit were sold at fair prices, the sale averaging \$340 per head for the entire offering, which was considered by Robert Miller, the manager of the sale, and Capt. T. A. Robson, as very satisfactory.

The auctioneers, Capt. Robson of London, Ont., Col. Bellows of Missouri, U. S., and Col. Jones of Chicago, Ill., demonstrated their pastmastership in

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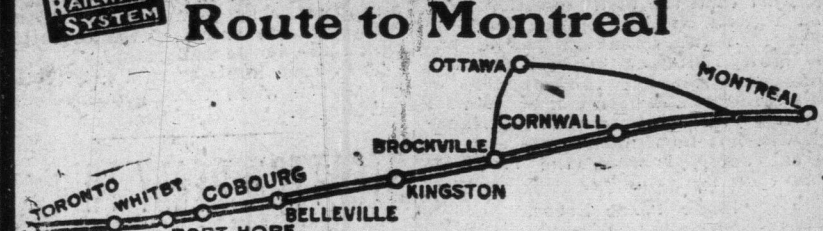

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may apply for a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. The homesteader must live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 40 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section of land on the homesteaded land in each of three years, only live months of homesteaded entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$30.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
