Delegate Morrison Comes to Annual Meeting With Friendly

winnipeg, Feb. 27.—A. R. Morrison, secretary of the Western Canada Cricket Association, left last night for Toronto to attend the annual meeting of the Canadian Cricket Association. He was seen off by a large number of local cricketers. The west has not been represented at the big meeting since 1887, owing to misunderstandings that have existed between the cricketers of the cast and those of the west. However, owing to the good offices of Dr. Dean, the president of the Canadian Association, and several prominent cricketers in the west, the breach is now about to be healed, and the season of 1911 will see nothing but friendly relations existing between these two parties. Several very important matters concerning the welfare of, the game will come up for discussion at the meeting. Amongst the more important will be suggestions made by the W.C.C.A., with a view to encouraging inter-provincial toursaments.

The west also recommend that the control of the international games should alternate between the different hodies affiliated with the C.C.A. (i.e., for every two years), and that the higher officers of the association be also alternate, and that the headquarters of the governing body be wherever the leading officers are chosen from. This will mean that the venue of the international match, when played in Canada, shall be subject to change.




