## DEATH OF W. J. R. MCINN.

Formerly a Resident of Toronto, Lately of the Finance Department at Ottawa.

A recent death in Ottawa was that of Mr. W. J. R. McInn of the insurance branch of the Department of Finance. Mr. McInn died on Friday last from pneumonia, and was in his 42nd year. He graduated from the University of Toronto in 1880, with the highest honors in mathematics. He leaves a widow, formerly a Miss Desrochers, sister of Mr. B. C. Desrochers, Assistant Secretary of the Public Works Department, and five children. He was a brother of Mr. Thomas McInn, formerly an engineer in the engineering of the Toronto Water Works Department, now Secretary of the American Society of Civil Engineers of New York. The late Mr. McInn was also a stepson of Mr. Robert Bell of the Toronto Custom House, whose wife was with her son during his extended illness.
