St. Catharines, Aug. 8.—A very sad drowning accident occurred here this afternoon about 5 o'clock. Two boys, Foy McTavish, aged 13, son of D. B. McTavish, secretary of the Wilson Carbide Works, and Joseph Smith, aged 14, son of Jacob Smith, cattle dealer, went down to Mack pass Pond, which joins the old Welland Canal, for a bath. They were learning to swim, and got too far out in the deep water and were both drowned.

OUR EXPORTS TO BRITAIN

During July Canada sent to the Mother Country Produce to the Value of \$2,836,536.

London, Aug. 7.—(Telegrams.)—The Board of Trade returns for the month of July show that the imports from Canada include 15,576 cattle, value \$277,988; sheep and lambs 8867, value \$102,300; wheat 429,424; meal and flour 131,300 cwt., value \$2,049,000; other goods \$14,200; butter 24,094 cwt., value \$1,100,000; cheese 265,094 cwt., value \$1,100,000; eggs 665,767; and other goods \$1,100,000. Total imports \$2,836,536; exports \$2,878,161.

To Wind Up a Medicine Co. At Osogood Hall yesterday the court granted an order for the winding up of the Woodway Medicine Company of Toronto, Limited, upon the application of H. J. Montgomery, who acted on behalf of Philip G. Howar, on a claim for \$500 wages. A second application for a like order was filed by Scott & Scott, on behalf of the Globe Ink Company of Akron, Ohio, upon a claim for \$400. Both petitions state that the company is insolvent.

Under the first, E. G. Clarkson was appointed interim liquidator, and a reference to take accounts has been directed to the Master-in-Ordinary. The second petition will come before the court on Tuesday. The president of the Woodway Medicine Company, Francis J. Kane and the secretary-treasurer Charles L. Gould.

TOWN TO-TOWN

Ald. Spence Would Dismiss the City Hall Architect, But the Mayor Won't Have It Just Now.

BOARD OF CONTROL WASTES TIME.

There is Little Business Being Done at the City Hall in This Year of Grace.

The Board of Control is not likely to have another meeting for a fortnight. The members actually discussed the matter yesterday suffering from incipient hydrophobia. They spent a whole forenoon periphrastically talking about the dismissal of Tom, Dick and Harry. But they really did not do anything. It was merely a case of opening the safety valve to let off the effects of the heat.

Council was recommended to appoint a special committee to investigate the botchers and machinery of the new City Hall and the men employed in running them. This is a hazardous proceeding even in hot weather. The controllers have not actually reached a dangerous stage and the holiday will tide them over the hot spell.

That Number Watered. Upon taking a seat at the Board of Control yesterday, the Mayor remarked that the Committee on Works had not, as Council members are wont to do, reported on the Engineer's report on the summer watered. He said the report would not be so good as it should be.

Ald. Spence: Why did Council not inquire into the matter? The Mayor: That is what I want now. Ald. Spence: Why not have the matter the other day he told us that he was very busy with other matters. He has time for that investigation?

The Mayor replied to the effect that other engagements would be the excuse for all that was needed from Mr. Hutts was his endorsement.

Why Bother Rust? Ald. Spence: Why not have the other gentlemen in this city? A recommendation was then passed that Council instruct the Engineer to report upon the Hutts' case.

Council Can Move the Track. A letter was read from Mr. Hutts with regard to the abuse of the Woodbine switch on the part of the Street Railway Company by directing passengers to Woodbine Park to alight there and wait for the next car. The Council, accordingly, decided that the company put down the Woodbine avenue switch. Mr. Hutts is entitled to compensation. His letter continued:

I am further complaining because of the company stopping cars at Woodbine and directing passengers to alight there and wait for the next car. This is a most inconvenient and dangerous arrangement for passengers and the company. I am of opinion that a passenger on the Woodbine car is entitled to a continuous ride on the car which presents his ticket, or pays his fare along the route he desires to take, subject to the transfer arrangements of that particular route and that the company cannot stop a car and compel a passenger to alight there and wait for the following car. A passenger carrying such a ticket, however, this would apply to extra cars. A passenger carrying such a ticket does so with knowledge that it is a special arrangement.

What Aid. Frame Says. Ald. Frame declared there was no real dissatisfaction of getting good service at the present time.

The Transfer System. Ald. Spence remarked that in the course of a conversation between Mr. Fullerton and himself, it was pointed out that there is no transfer system at the present time.
