

ORDERING YANKEE MEAT BY THE MILLION POUNDS

Russia's War Department Sends in
Two Big Rush Orders to
Armour and Cudahy.

Kansas City, Mo., Dec. 28.—The Russian government has just placed an order with Armour & Co. of this city for \$1,000,000 worth of meat for the army. The order calls for the delivery of the meat at San Francisco by Jan. 22. The meat, it is said, is for the use of the Russian army, and its destination is said to be Port Arthur.

Des Moines, Ia., Dec. 28.—The Cudahy Packing Company of South Omaha is in receipt of a rush order for 1,000,000 pounds of extra meat for the Russian government. The shipment must reach San Francisco before Jan. 20, when two Russian ships will sail with beef and other supplies.

NO ONE TO BLAME

For the Connellville Accident, Says
Railroad Investigator.

Pittsburgh, Dec. 28.—Supt. B. W. Duer of the Pittsburgh Division of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad has made a complete investigation of the cause of the wreck of the Duquesne Limited last Wednesday night, near Dawson, Pa.

He has found that no employee of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad was responsible for the accident, which is declared to have been unavoidable.

A few unidentified dead still remain at Connellville.

4000 REVOLUTIONISTS READY.

Turkey Threatened by Macedonians
and Bulgarians Ordered.

Salonica, European Turkey, Dec. 28.—The authorities are informed that 4000 Macedonian revolutionists, under the leadership of eighty Bulgarian officers, are ready to invade Turkish territory.

An order was issued here to-day requesting the Turkish officers to exercise extreme vigilance.

It is rumored that the second army reserve will again be called out.

LABOR SEEKS AID OF CHURCH.

Appeals to Ministerial Association
for Support in Elections.

A deputation consisting of Messrs. G. H. Reekes and A. J. Raynor, from the executive of the Toronto Labor

party, waited on the Toronto Ministerial Association this morning, with an appeal for church support in the coming election. Their plea was that recent legal decisions had had the effect of weakening the force of strikes and boycotts, and the laboring people were turning towards securing legislation to improve their condition. The leaders of the movement were for the greater part Christians in sentiment and strong temperance advocates. The labor party was representative of the poor man or wage earner as distinguished from the wealthy and therefore desired church support.

Their party, they said, believed that the laws affecting the laboring classes should be made by their equals for the same reason that a man should be tried by a jury of his equals. The common people were the backbone of the church and should therefore be an interest to the church. The labor party also wanted women's franchise and direct legislation to promote temperance.

A sympathetic hearing was given to the address, but as there was no request for an immediate decision the association passed no resolution on the matter.

A paper by Rev. Dr. McTavish was read, which dealt with "The Condition of Success in Ministerial Work," and in which he held that success was in no way to be judged by the size of the crowd or the amount on the collection plates.

\$5000 FIRE IN ZERO WEATHER.
Blanket Section of Adams Bros.
Harrisburg Shop Burned Out.

The cold weather is giving the firemen a severe experience. There was a \$5000 blaze in the premises of Adams Bros., harness manufacturers, King and Frederick-streets, yesterday afternoon. The fire started at 1:30, and was confined to the second and third floors, the latter of which was used as a blanket factory. One of the radiators was frozen, and the engine was with the aid of a torch, when some waste became ignited. The blaze spread rapidly, and gave the firemen a half-hour's work. The engine received a slight alarm. About a dozen people will be thrown out of work for a day or two, as the building will be repaired. A number of girls employed in the building became nervous but were soon calmed.

The employees fought the fire as long as they could and then retreated, men tumbling one flat down the stairs, and the lucky escape of many.

The loss is covered by insurance. It is not many months ago since the clothing department of this firm was burned out in the old premises at King and George-streets.

MOB WANTS HIS BLOOD.

Sargent, Ky., Dec. 28.—William Sheppard of Letcher County has been arrested and is in danger of lynching at Whitesburg. He was the brother-in-law of the late John Marshall, who was killed by a mob. Sheppard's wife and her infant child were shot and killed by the mob. Sheppard was wounded with another bullet. The murderer then fled, but was captured.

INVENTOR FOUND DEAD.

Boston, Dec. 28.—After the firemen had extinguished a fire in a three-story brick block in Court-street, to-day, they found the body of John Marshall in his room on the third floor. He had been dead three or four days. He was an inventor, and had long been at work on models for airplanes. He was 75 years old.

To Regenerate Tenement Workers.

New York, Dec. 28.—A plan to operate a chain of cotton mills in North Carolina by tenement workers of this city, taken there and trained by a few skilled workers, is being evolved. It carried out, it will take hundreds of women and children from the dirty, overcrowded slums of the city into a healthy country life, with cottages and schools.

Ward Number 4.

Ex-Ald. James Crane seeks re-election for Ward 4. During his previous term of office Mr. Crane proved himself a worthy representative, always on the look-out for the interests of his constituents, and at the same time always opposed to even the suspicion of wrongdoing. GROWING FOR REVISION NOW SAID TO BE STRONG

False Telegram Bore Wrong Date,
Col. Henry Forgetting April
Had Only 30 Days.

Paris, Dec. 28.—The grounds upon which Dreyfus depends for vindication and restoration to the army have been communicated to the Associated Press. Dreyfus charges that a telegram from Col. Schwartzkoppen, the late German Military Attaché here, to Col. Panisard, formerly Italian Military Attaché at Paris as presented to the court-martial at Rennes, bore the date of April, 1894, when he was occupied with the details of the mobilization of troops, of which the telegram treated, whereas the actual date of the telegram was the last of March, 1895, after he (Dreyfus) had been tried.

A copy which has been found has established the correctness of Dreyfus' claim. In the opinion of the commission, which recommended a revision of the case, the statement of the telegram, when it arrived at the Ministry of War, was dated April 1, 1895, which Dreyfus claims to be the date of the telegram. The telegram was written in the latter part of March of that year. The late Col. Henry clipped off a portion of the telegram, and the actual date disappeared. Col. Henry, in his own hand, annotated the telegram, April, 1894. The commission, however, neglected to remember that the month of April had only 30 days, for in the document there is a mention of the thirty-first of the current month.

The unauthenticity of the telegram could have been established had the court at Rennes appreciated the importance of the error. Finally it developed that the telegram, where the words "ce canaille de..." appear, the initial "d" had been substituted for the letter "p." The original copy, written by M. Grébillin, the keeper of the archives of the War Office, carried the letter "p." The scratching upon the paper was apparent, but M. Berillon, the handwriting expert, testified that the letter "d" was correct. It is now claimed he was in error.
