The Empress Rules!

Resignation of the Emperor of China.

Report Has It That His Imperial Highness Is Dead.
The Change Likely to Strengthen Russian Influence in China.
Belief in India That England Will Soon Take Khyber Pass.
Loss of a French Vessel With Her Crew of Thirty-Six.

France Will Not Send Reinforcements to Marahan—Hundreds of Lives Lost by the Floods in China—Gravity of the Situation in France.
RUMORED DEATH OF THE CHINESE EMPEROR.
Shanghai, Sept. 23.—A local rumor is current here to the effect that the Emperor of China is dead. No details are obtainable, but it is said the gates of Peking are closed.
Pekin, Sept. 23.—An imperial edict just issued definitely announces that the Emperor of China has resigned his power to the empress (dowager empress), who has ordered the ministers to deliver to her in future their official reports.
It is difficult to obtain reliable information from the palace in regard to the proceeding, but the recent reformatory edicts probably caused the change. While the emperor was subservient and a mere figurehead, the dowager empress permitted him to remain in peace. But so soon as he attempted to act on his own initiative his practical deposition was the result. His principal adviser, Kang-Yunlei, the Cantonese reformer, fell in spite of the vigorous attempt made to arrest him, and it is said he is now on his way to Shanghai.
THE EFFECT.
The effect of the change must be great, and in all probability Li Hung Chang will be reinstated in power and Russian influence will be made to the hopes of reform so ardently cherished by the intelligent factions of the Chinese are now impossible of fulfillment. The suddenness of the coup is said to be due to the desire of the dowager empress to prevent the mission of the Marquis Ito from being successful. The Japanese statesman recently came to Peking with the object of trying to bring about an alliance, offensive and defensive, between Japan and China. The new order of things will undoubtedly prejudice British interests in China.
The wording of the present edict is not yet obtainable, but it is in effect a declaration that the dowager empress to assume power, this being the third time the request has been made.

THE EMPRESS ANGRY.
London, Sept. 23.—The Daily Mail's Pekin correspondent, telegraphing Wednesday, says: "The Dowager empress is greatly incensed over Russia's passivity over Li Hung Chang's degradation and Sir Claude McDougal's attitude since Li Hung Chang's resignation. He has been granted to the Russian charge d'affaires, several lengthy audiences. Probably Li Hung Chang will return to power, but not to office. The wildest rumors are afloat. It is reported that the emperor has had alterations with the Tseung Li Yamen, and the dowager empress."

THIRTY LIVES LOST.

Paris, Sept. 23.—The French vessel
Ville de Pezamp drowned yesterday off Pezamp, and her crew of 36 were drowned.

NO REINFORCEMENTS FOR MAR-CHAND.

Paris, Sept. 23.—An official denial has
been issued of the statement published in the Journal that the government intends to send reinforcements to Major Marchand.

TO TAKE KHYBER PASS.

London, Sept. 23.—There is a growing
belief in Indian circles here that Great Britain will shortly take possession of Khyber Pass, the principal northern pass from Afghanistan into India.

A SWAP.

Berlin, Sept. 23.—The Zanzibar cor-
respondent of the Frankfurter Zeitung records the prevalent belief existing there that England will cede Zanzibar to Germany, in return for German concessions regarding Delagoa Bay.

PRINCESS OLGA ENGAGED.

Berlin, Sept. 23.—Princess Olga of
Wurtemberg, one of the richest heiresses in Europe, is engaged to Prince Max of Schaumburg-Lippe, whose elder brother married her twin sister, Princess Elisa, last year.

BIG WHEAT CROP IN FRANCE.

Paris, Sept. 23.—The French wheat
crop is estimated at 123,000,000 hectolitre, the largest since 1874, when the yield was 136,000,000 hectolitres. This will render France independent of foreign importations of wheat.

FOR FOUR HOURS!

St. Vincent Was Subjected to
Hurricane Fury.

First Accounts of the Devastation Were Not Exaggerated.

Three Hundred Lives Were Lost in St.
Vincent City Alone—Ten Thousand Houses Swept Away and 100 Lives Lost in Barbadoes.

Kingston, Jamaica, Sept. 23.—Mail
advice which reached here today brought details of the hurricane in the vicinity of St. Vincent, St. Lucia, and Barbadoes, showing that the first accounts were not exaggerated.

At St. Vincent about 300 lives were
lost, not counting the loss of life suffered through the destruction of shipping. The coast is strewn with the wrecks of vessels.

WRECKED THE ISLAND.

The storm raged from 10 o'clock in
the morning on Sunday, Sept. 11, till 2 o'clock in the afternoon, completely wrecking the island. At the capital, Kingston, fully 200 houses were demolished.

Throughout the island the destruc-
tion was on the wholesale scale, nearly all the estates and buildings being razed and cultivation being demoralized. A dozen towns or villages were destroyed. No approximate value of the damage done has been recorded, but the island has been practically ruined.

AT ST. LUCIA.

St. Lucia suffered mostly from rain
and landslides, the deluge lasting ten hours. Thirteen lives were lost. The full extent of the damage has not been computed, but it is incomparably less than at St. Vincent.

TEN THOUSAND HOUSES SWEEPED AWAY.

Kingston, Jamaica, Sept. 23.—The hur-
ricane struck the island of Barbadoes on the night of the 10th, completely wrecking that flat, exposed island, and sweeping away ten thousand houses, while damaging thousands more. This left three-quarters of the inhabitants homeless. Over 100 people were killed as far as known.

NO DELAY!

Cuba Must Be Evacuated by the Span-
iards at Once.

Washington, Sept. 23.—A very per-
emptory message of instruction has been sent to the Cuban military commission and by them made the basis of a note to the Spanish commissioners. The authorities in Washington will not make public the terms of the note, but its general tenor is that the United States will not be satisfied with any further delay in the evacuation of Cuba.

CABLE NOTES.

Admiral Cervera arrived at Madrid
on Thursday. There were no incidents worth noting in connection with his return.

NOW HE WILL HAVE TO STOP.

O'Brien Married Two Canadian Girls
on the Same Day—Also Wedded Two Michigan and One Winnipeg Woman.

Toronto, Sept. 23.—Marrying two wo-
men on the same day in the same city, keeping two separate households for several years also in the same city, is a feat few men are credited with.

At yesterday's police court, Henry
O'Brien, a former C. P. R. foreman, was proven to have accomplished this feat some years ago.

Further, it was shown that one wo-
man, Sara Ryan, was married to him by a Catholic priest a few hours before his marriage to Nettie Graham, at which a Protestant clergyman presided. By a strange coincidence each woman bore a child on the same day, and exactly eleven months after marriage with O'Brien.

The latter deserted both wives after
living with them a few years, and leaving Canada, married at Detroit and Lansing. He also deserted his wives at those places, and returning to Canada married a woman at Winnipeg, whom he deserted last spring at North Augusta, Me.

Then he again returned to Canada,
was arrested at Portage la Prairie for theft, identified as being wanted here, and brought to Toronto, where Sara Ryan charged him with bigamy. Prisoner pleaded guilty to all the charges and was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary.
